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

al function to perform in war as well as in peace but it is somewhat different.

The country can no longer afford to have young men proceed with their education at a moderate tempo. Extra curriculum activities not specifically directed toward physical or mental preparation for participation in the war effort can no longer be encouraged. In war times recreation in college life must be limited to that necessary for a healthy and well-rounded existence. In other words, the colleges in war time must be places of intensive effort and accomplishment. For those colleges which are prepared to proceed with education along these lines, and for those young men who are prepared to enter or remain in college with these purposes and who have the qualities of mind and character to carry them out, the army and navy will enlist a substantial number of each men in the appropriate enlisted reserve corps, and under present conditions will leave them on an inactive status to continue their education, subject to immediate call of the secretary of war or the secretary of navy.
