### Films to Aid in Accident Prevention

Intensified accident prevention activities are essential to the attainment of greatest possible efficiency in transportation, according to government authorities, and as a part of the safety program in Oregon, a library of safety films has been made available to commercial operators by the state traffic division.

Truck companies, plants and stores operating fleets of trucks, and other fleet operators are invited to make use of the sound strip films on various phases of accident prevention, now available at the office of the state safety division.

In the event a projector is desired a machine may be obtained along with the films, it was announced. The safety film service may be arranged for by writing Earl Snell, secretary of state, Salem, Oregon.

(continued from page 2) choose one of those sets containing either tooth paste or shaving cream, you won't need to turn in an old couponable tube. This is the only instance in which you can buy tubes of toothpaste or shaving cream without a turn in, and it is the result of an amendment allowing dealers to clear their stocks of these gift kits if they are intended as a present to any member of the armed forces.

AS LONG as Mrs. America restricts herself and her family in travel, there is hope that the government will not be forced to put a drastic clamp down on the cause of the travel situation—it you can help. Save those tires and do not use your car for long holiday trips, and aside from vacations forego travel for mere pleasure. Be a patriotic vacationist and holiday close at home. If you're off for your vacation, arrange your trip so you won't be adding to the heavily increased volume of passengers on railroads and bus lines by going or coming on weekends. Incidentally, because of the travel situation—it looks as if another American custom—attending conventions—will be soft pedaled for the duration.

YOUR husband's "zoot suit" is bound to be a victory model according to a clarification of the ban of cuffs on men's wool trousers by the WPB apparel section. It seems that since the order originally did not apply to merchant tailors or tailored-to-the-trade, some people took their suit trousers unfinished from the store to the tailors to have the cuffs completed. But WPB shook its finger at such a practice and extended the no-cuff ban to trousers made by tailors.

DO YOU know what a precious stone is? The Office of Price Administration defines "Precious stones" as any mounting into which a precious stone is set, and a precious stone as any ruby, sapphire, emerald, natural pearl or any diamond weighing more than one carat. Semi-precious stones are included in the classification if they have been sold for more than \$100 by the cutter. When two or more diamonds with an aggregate weight of one and a half carats are set in one mounting, the diamond is considered precious. Precious stones are exempted from the provisions of the general maximum price regulation.

AND speaking of precious items, consider the quinine in your medicine cabinet. It is an anti-malarial substance that may mean the difference between life and death to members of our armed forces fighting in the tropics. WPB orders will prevent the use of quinine and various other products from the bark of the china tree for non-essential purposes. Except for small parcels of bark from South America, our supplies of china products include only the reserve built up be-

fore the war. Ordinarily our supplies come from Java.

WOOD, Mrs. America's standby since the all-out drafting of metals, is seeing more and more service. WPB restrictions on both hard and soft woods call attention to military usefulness of wood and its various products such as charcoal for gas masks, cellulose in gun powder and turpentine in flame throwers. Hulls of small torpedo boats and bomb bay doors of bombing planes are among the many uses of plywood. The stocks of Garand rifles feature solid walnut. The lumber that goes into one minesweeper, it is estimated, is the same amount that would go into the making of 20 average civilian homes.

PRICE control is credited with helping your dollar win the first round of the battle against inflation. For the first time since November 1940, the rising cost of living has been checked according to a study by the Bureau of Labor statistics. Declines were noted in rent, clothing and house furnishings. Food costs, which are not entirely under price regulation, rose slightly.
