Public Cooperating In Phone Usage

Acknowledgement of the splendid cooperation shown by telephone users in helping the telephone industry to meet unprecedented wartime demands in the face of restrictions necessary to save materials vital to the war was expressed this week by N. R. Powley, president of The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, in a report covering the coast-wide operations of the company during the first six months of 1942.

Copy of the report was received by H. S. Aikens, local manager of the company, who stated that it also showed that more than 1300 telephone employees are now in military service and that 97 per cent of the coast-wide personnel is purchasing United States War Savings Bonds through the payroll allotment plan.

The telephone president's report said in part: "Our company in its all-out war effort, through its resources, facilities and personnel is earnestly engaged throughout all branches of its work in playing its full, effective and patriotic part to take our country through to victory."

In compliance with orders of the War Production Board regarding the conservation and restriction of the use by telephone companies of all materials essential to the war effort, all telephone installations are made subject to the requirements of these orders.

bottles as you have room to store. Wash the caps and put them away for the day when relishes will appear on grocers' shelves without the usual cap over the seal. The old covers will come in handy then.

WAR Production Board orders curtailing civilian use of essential raw materials have been rolling off the line for a year now—diverting hundreds of items from family use to military needs. Figures show that your family—the average American family—is giving up 3.12 pounds of aluminum a year—enough required for eight incendiary bombs. The brass your family is doing without is just what it takes for 36 .30 caliber cartridges. The list goes on and on—1,000 tons of iron and steel for the war effort instead of for ash trays and 25,000 tons of precious metals that will help put the Axis in the shade instead of being made into Venetian blinds. Even the children are doing their part—100,000 tons of iron and steel saved from toy production goes into the nation's war effort.

IF YOU are a city resident, your family can still expect bus service to beaches, public parks and other resorts for the time being. The Office of Defense Transportation contends that American fam-

ilies need the relaxation and rest they get at beaches and similar resorts even more these days because of the heavy pressure of war work. That being the case, restrictions on intercity bus service will not apply to your beach excursion as long as the facilities are available. But you are urged to visit resorts in the immediate vicinity of your home.

WHIMS in redecorating or painting are out for the duration. However, if repainting and redecorating are absolutely necessary for the maintenance of your home or apartment, they are permitted and without specific authorization. As you know, all civilian construction is under WPB control so that non-essential building and redecorating will not cut down the material, equipment and labor available for direct war work.

THE CHANCES are that you won't put off the daily cleaning care of your electric range since WPB's order freezing electric kitchen ranges in the hands of dealers. Of course, you will be able to get replacement parts, but today's watchword for making your stove last as long as possible is care. The outside surfaces, burners and units, broiler and oven should be cleaned daily. Wait until the range is cool before washing the porcelain outside with warm soapy water for if it is hot when cleaned there is danger of cracking the porcelain finish. The OPM consumer division advises you that spilled food may cause

discoloration if it is allowed to dry or harden on the range. Acid, lemon juice or vinegar endanger the glaze of the enamel unless they are cleaned off immediately. The consumer division advises against using the oven as a storage place for food.

YOUR choice of shades and odors of various cosmetics probably will be limited very soon. A forthcoming limitation on the production of cosmetics is expected to simplify lady's beauty aids by cutting down on the range of shades and odors. As you know, cosmetic packaging is due to undergo quite a change to eliminate the use of critical materials for containers. Experimental copies of wooden lipstick holders and cold cream jars with paper tops already have been made.

HERE'S a colorful note. The amount of fast dyes available for civilian use during the period of July 1 to September 30 has been increased. Now, Mrs. America's family may expect that 70 percent of the amount of anthraquinone dyes used in 1941 will go for civilian use.

IF YOU still have two pounds of rubber around your house for which you have no need, turn it in because it is equivalent to the amount of rubber needed for a gas mask or a roll of adhesive tape for the medical corps. But while you have been ransacking the house for rubber salvage, do be careful not to turn in any perfectly good rubbers or galoshes. That will only necessitate replacing these valuable articles with new purchases. Hold on to your rubbers or galoshes even if they are too small or if you are missing one of the mates because a pool is being contemplated for the exchange of those precious articles.

HERE'S good news for your marketing dollar. The new OPA price regulation on beef and veal (effective July 13) will assure you that you are getting the quality of meat for which you pay. The regulation provides that ceiling
