WAR Production Board orders curtailing civilian use of essential raw materials have been rolling off the line for a year now-diverting hundreds of items from family use to military needs, Figures show that your family-the average American family-is giving up 3.12 pounds of aluminum a year-enough required for eight incendiary bombs. The brass your family is doing without is just what it takes for 36 .30 caliber cartridges. The list goes on and on-1,000 tons of iron and steel for the war effort instead of for ash trays and 25,000 tons of precious metals that will help put the Axis in the shade instead of being made into Venetian blinds. Even the children are doing their part-100,000 tons of iron and steel saved from toy production goes into the nation's war effort.


