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### EXAMINER COMING

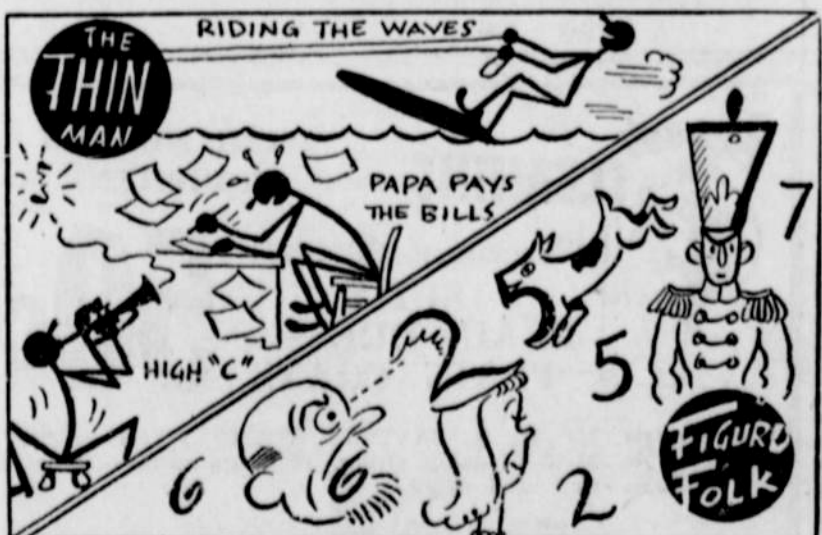

## SIX INCH SERMON

K.L.V. ROBERT H. HARPER

Cain and Abel: A Contrast.  
Lesson for July 19; Gen. 4:1-15.  
Golden Text: Hebrews 11:4.

In the story of Cain and Abel first appears the idea of sacrifice. Both brought gifts unto God. How did their offerings differ? Certainly not in the things offered. Cain's later conduct proved that his offering lacked consecration of heart, while "by faith Abel offered a more excellent sacrifice than Cain."

Instead of mending his own ways, after God had talked with him, Cain visited his fury upon his brother and stained the earth with the blood of the first murder. His heartless question in answer to God has been heard through the ages. It should be asked, not in cruel indifference, but in realization of responsibility for our brothers.

Cain's curse has come upon all murders. Dread of vengeance has disturbed all who have shed blood.

What was the sign God appointed unto Cain? No one knows. Why was he to be protected? Because God reserves vengeance unto himself. The state assumes the right to punish murderers but private vengeance only perpetuates the wrong and brings the avenger into the same guilt with the offender. We see the tendency to evil contrasted in the two brothers. Abel withstood, while his brother yielded and went the whole way of sin. In his blood which cries from that primal field we find more than an evidence of man's hate; in Abel we find an example of faith that rises triumphant over the tendencies to evil in human nature and achieves a life independent of circumstances and physical death.

Defeat is complete when it is admitted.

## Counties Classified For Safety Contest

A new classification of counties on a basis of population was announced today for the 1942 Oregon Counties Traffic Safety Contest, sponsored each year by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

Counties were segregated into four divisions for the contest. The first division includes counties with over 40,000 population, the second division runs from 25,000 to 40,000, the third from 10,000 to 25,000 and the fourth under 10,000 population.

Following are the counties in each division, listed according to their standings in the contest at the end of May.

First: Klamath, Lane, Clackamas, Marion, Multnomah.  
Second: Coos, Douglas, Yamhill, Linn, Jackson, Umatilla, Washington.  
Third: Malheur, Tillamook, Deschutes, Benton, Lincoln, Wasco, Hood River, Clatsop, Columbia, Polk, Union, Josephine, Baker.  
Fourth: Wallowa, Crook, Jefferson, Sherman, Gilliam, Lake, Wheeler, Curry, Harney, Morrow, Grant.
