SIX INCH SERMON

ALV. ROBERT H. HARPER

Isaac Practises Peace. Lesson for August 16: Genesis 26: 18-31.

Golden Text: Matthew 5:9. Contrasted with his father, who fought when he thought it neces-

Contrasted with his father, who fought when he thought it necessary, Isaac was a man of peace. From the wells he had reopened and from two others he had digged he withdrew, when herdsmen of the Philistines strove with his, and at length he won the

right to dwell in peace.
At Beersheba, Isaac received renewed assurance of God's blessings to him and his people, and he built there an altar and worshipped.

The story has several good lessons. As Isaac reopened the wells, his father had digged, we need at times to renew the faith we have received. However, it is also sig-nificant that Isaac reopened other wells. No generation can exhaust the truth. As every generation has its problems, we must apply old truth to new and present need

It is further significant that Isaac arose from his knees at the altar he had built at Beersheba to meet Abimilech as he came to offer a league of friendship.

Surely the ravaged world needs the man of peace. We cannot foresee whether a year or years must pass in the present conflict. Of necessity we now fight, but we look for a decision that will give every man the opportunity to dwell in peace, as it will give his nation and all nations the o tunity to work out their own destinies unmolested. In this hope it

is profitable to have before us this ancient example of Isaac, who won his way to peace by being peaceable.

Two hundred children, 42 of whom left parents behind in concentration camps, were among the 800 war refugees who reached sanctuary when their ship docked at Baltimore, Md. Some of the 42 warorphaned youngsters are pictured packing away a good American lunch upon arrival. Because of the danger of retribution being visited upon relatives trapped by the "new order," the children are known only by their initials.


