CAMP WHITE SPORTS ARENA OPENED

Numerous activities are in store for the men of Camp White in the newly opened Camp White Sports Arena, it was announced today from Headquarters, Camp White, Oregon. Activities provided for in the huge building, one of the largest in southern Oregon, include basketball, volleyball, badminton, boxing, wrestling, weight lifting, light striking bags and heavy training bags, tumbling parallel bars, horizontal bars, stand bars, and the various types of exercises such as pulleys, medicine balls, and rowing machine.

Basketball tournaments are scheduled to begin November 15, or sooner depending upon the number of men who indicate an interest in the sport and sign for teams. It is anticipated that a post basketball team will be organized consisting of the best players on the post, these to be determined by their performances in the various tournaments.

Volley ball will come in for considerable attention. It is planned that a volley ball tournament will be held among the teams in the various post units, with a champion selected. Trophies are to be awarded the winners.

Officers of the various units are urged to contact the Arena Director to arrange for time for officers on arena courts. The building is open from 4 p. m. to 6 p. m. for free play, during which any one may use the facilities the various athletic devices provide. From 6 p. m. to 11 p. m. various units of camp take over the devices.

Service Command Units and units of the Ninth Army Corps should arrange for time by contacting the arena director, the announcement said, while units of the 81st Division should make arrangements through Lt. Eugene Oates, athletic director.

Battered Grizzlies to Face Yreka Friday Eve.

The Ashland high Grizzlies battered and bruised as a result of their clashes with Klamath Falls and Grants Pass, will return to the gridiron wars after a week's lay-off next Friday night when they meet the Yreka Miners on the California turf.

Yreka has lost but one game to the season when they dropped a date, that being their first one of 13-0 decision to the Medford Tigers. Since then they have defeated all opposition and lead the Northern California League. Ashland, on the other hand, won their first game from Lakeview and since have been kicked around by Klamath Falls and Grants Pass.

Coach Roland Parks, Grizzly mentor, says the week-long lay-off has done his team a lot of good and they have regained their confidence which was lost some what abused by their two decisive defeats. Parks adds that most of the injuries have now healed and the squad as a whole are in good condition.

The Ashland coaching staff points out that Yreka must not be taken lightly for they have a fine ball club this year. It must be remembered that last season Ashland was lucky to win 7 to 6 and Yreka has most of that same team back while the Grizzly aggregation is made up mostly of reserve players from last year.

Chiropractic Service Declared Important

Paying high compliment to the 700 doctors who have enlisted in the Volunteer Chiropractic Corps, a prospective Army unit, Dr. W. G. Poehner, of Chicago, president of the National Chiropractic Association, today declared in a message to the NCA House of Counselors that "we not only know that we can give the greatest help to men in the mechanized forces of the Army, but we also know that our services are also extremely vital in the maintenance of public health."

More than 20 million Americans are dependent on the Chiropractic profession for their health needs, it was disclosed.

Dr. Poehner said he hopes the Army powers can be convinced of the need for the Chiropractic Corps and a generally expanded health program.

Pointing to the prediction of colder houses, the need to walk long distances in inclement weather and possible diminished means of sustenance, "it is evident that the public demand for our service will be the greatest in history," the NCA president asserted.

Dr. Poehner recalled the revelation in Liberty magazine some months ago that if Chiropractic and Osteopathy had been universally used in the flu epidemic of 1918 at least 45,000 lives would have been saved.

The article also said that "the death rate among the soldiers suffering from pneumonia in 1918 was 34 1/2 per cent. They were treated in accordance with the allopathic measures advocated by the medical system that controlled the healing art in this country. Chiropractors, excluded from army camps, claims a mortality rate in the treatment of influenza of about 2.1 per cent."

CAMPAIGN VISIT MADE BY H. ELLSWORTH

Ashland and Southern Jackson county were visited last week by Harris Ellsworth, Republican candidate for Representative in the U. S. Congress from the new Fourth district. Ellsworth spent almost a week in the county matching his personal work with the work of the local committee for his campaign and with the work of the voluntary committee of Veterans for Ellsworth which was formed last week by world war veteran in the district. Ellsworth himself was in the service during the former world war.

Ellsworth praised the legislative act which created the new Fourth district, grouping the southwestern Oregon counties, Linn, Lane, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry together to form the congressional unit. These counties, he pointed out, represent a great undeveloped empire with vast mineral, timber, power and agricultural wealth as yet only slightly developed.

"I know," Ellsworth said, "that our district can provide vast quantities of materials needed in the war effort if the minerals, coal, timber and other resources are properly developed. We want to give these things to our nation for the war effort and for the reconstruction period that will follow. I shall never seek to "get" for the district—but rather to give to the country from the district.

Harris Ellsworth is publisher of the Roseburg News-Review and has been a resident of the district for the last 15 years. He has been consistently active in public service work and is at present the appointed state senator from Douglas county, is president of the "Keep Oregon Green Committee" appointed by the governor.

Ellsworth concluded his trip to this country Wednesday and went to northern Lane and Linn counties to conclude the campaign which ends with the general election next Tuesday, November 3.

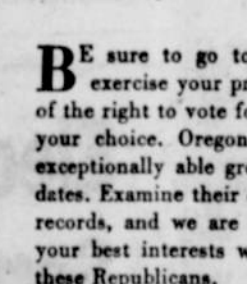
