CAMPAIGN VISIT MADE BY H. ELLSWORTH

Ashland and Southern Jackson county were visited last week by Harris Ellsworth, Republican candidate for Representative in the U.S. Congress from the new Fourth district. Ellsworth spent almost a week in the county matching his personal work with the work of the local committee for his campaign and with the work of the voluntary committee of Veterans for Ellsworth which was formed last week by world war veteran in the district, Ellsorth himself was in the service during the former world war.

Ellsworth praised the legislative act which created the new Fourth district, grouping the southwestern Oregon counties, Linn, Lane, Douglas, Jackson, Linn, Lane, Douglas, Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry to-gether to form the congressional unit. These counties he pointed out, represent a great undeveloped empire with vast mineral, timber, power and agricultural wealth as yet only slightly developed .
