This is the first time in several years that Grants Pass has had the privelege of playing for the crown and they hove no intention of letting the championship go to Klamath Falls. At any rate, it promises to be a hard-fought contest from start to finish and reports from the KUHS officials indicate that a capacity crowd can be expected for this crucial
