Hindsight On Sports

By I Told You So

It will be a big occasion for the Grants Pass Cavemen come Friday night when they meet the powerful Klamath Falls football team for the southern Oregon championship. This is the first time in several years that Grants Pass has not been kicked all over the park by every opponent in the league and they are out to make the most of it. Last year Klamath Falls, Medford, and Ashland tied Grants Pass sole occupant of the cellar position.

The Pelicans from over the hill rate a slight favorite to cop the crown because of their weight advantage and the fact that they are undefeated and untied so far this season. The Cavemen, while not having such a heavy backfield, has a line that will probably be able to hold it's own against the Pelican's hard-charging forward wall. Grants Pass, too, is unbeaten but has two ties marked up against them. These are that surprising 7-7 deadlock with the powerful Marshfield eleven and a 6-6 knot with North Bend. And the last feature in favor of the Klamath gang, but far from being the least, is their ability to shoot in almost unlimited reserves while the Cavemen do not have such a lot of subs of string caliber.

Ashland and Medford fight it out Friday, Nov. 13, to see which club gets the cellar position. They are evenly matched and, like the Klamath-Grants Pass game a hard fought battle is expected.

Hindsight brought his prognosticating percentage up to 525 last week with seven out of 10 being correct. Here is the dope bucket

for the coming week-end: California to win from Oregon at Berkeley, northern to smear St. Mary's at New York, Oregon state to get back in the running against Washington at Seattle. UCLA to take another step toward the Rose Bowl at the expense of Stanford at Los Angeles, Minnesota to stop Northwestern at Minneapolis, Notre Dame to win from the Navy, Michigan to beat Illinois at Ann Arbor, Klamath Falls to win the conference championship from Grants Pass, Eureka to beat the listless Medford Tigers, and Ashland to win a close one from Yreka.

INJURIES PROBABLY WILL KEEP CALHOUN OUT OF FROSH GAME

Because of injuries suffered in the game with Grants Pass Cavemen last week, Charlie Calhoun, star backfield ace of Leonard Warren's junior high football team probably will not be able to see action with his teammates tonight (Thursday) on Walter Phillips field when they seek revenge for an earlier defeat against the Klamath Falls Freshmen. Other than this, Warren says his squad is in good shape and promise to do their best against their heavier opponents.

The probable starting lineup will find Jim Merriman at right end, Wilbur Taylor at right tackle, Gordon Peterson at right guard, Bob Frazier at center, Glen Speece at left guard, Bob Miller at left tackle, and Joe Lambert at left end. In the backfield will be Leon Hainey at quarterback, Tommy Newton at right half, Jim Jandreau at left half and Dommie Provost at fullback.

CONFERENCE TITLE TO BE DECIDED IN BIG GAME FRIDAY

Two great high school football teams, the Grants Pass Cavemen and the Klamath Pelicans, will

clash on the Klamath Falls turf Friday night to determine the southern Oregon high school championship. Both elevens are unbeaten this season, Grants Pass has been tied by Marshfield and North Bend while beating Medford and Ashland. The Pelicans have won all their games, having defeated Grant High of Portland, Redding, Eureka, Ashland, and Medford in that order.

The odds are slightly in favor of Klamath Falls due to their superior weight advantage although the Cavemen are not midgeets themselves. Then, too, there are those two ties against the Pass record while Klamath has kept all opponents from even coming close.

Using the same opponents as a comparison, it is hard to figure who might be the winner. Klamath Falls won from Ashland 26 to 0 while Grants Pass polished the Grizzlies off 33 to 0. The Pelicans whipped Medford 32 to 0 while the best the Cavemen could do was 12 to 6.

This is the first time in several years that Grants Pass has had the privilege of playing for the crown and they have no intention of letting the championship go to Klamath Falls. At any rate, it promises to be a hard-fought contest from start to finish and reports from the KUHS officials indicate that a capacity crowd can be expected for this crucial tilt.
