## 18 U.O. Alumni War Victims To Be Honored

U. of O., Eugene, Nov. 19—Eighteen University of Oregon alumni have given their lives thus far in helping to protect the nation against Axis tyranny, it was officially announced by the alumni office this week. Each of the men will be honored by a gold star set in a large new service flag which will be hung from the administration building.

The service flag was presented to the university by alumni and students who contributed \$81.42 to a "penny parade" at the annual Homecoming football game Saturday. A new star will be added for each alumnus killed in the service, officials have announced.

Those listed by the alumni office as having made the supreme sacrifice are—Ensigns Verdi Sederstrom, formerly of Salem, and Eldon Wyman, Portland, killed at Pearl Harbor; Captain Dale Lassalle, Captain Earl C. Williams, Cadet Leonard Dallif, Captain Edwin E. Swanson, all of Portland; Second Lieutenant Ernie Robertson, Cadet Leonard Gard, Colonel James A. Meek, Charles F. Goetting, Harold C. Jepson, Captain Harry Q. Findley, and Cadet Herbert Jones, all of Eugene; Second Lieutenant Edwir Morene, Reed-sport; Naval Cadet Donald Rockwell, Pilot Rock; Lieutenant Kent Stitzer, Colorado; Cadet Byron Vandenburg, Sacramento; and Lieutenant James O. Reed, Raymond, Washington.

**Sunday Supper brings Cream Tomato Waffles**  
served with bacon strips

MOTHER used to say, "Sunda's supper is the perfect meal at which to show off your special trick dishes." I thought of that the other day when mixing these waffles.



Made with tomato soup they had lovely flavor and a faintly rosy color, too, that was most appetizing. Then as a final touch I topped them with crisp bacon — and the family loved them. Maybe yours will, too:

- 1 1/2 cups flour (pastry)
  - 1/2 teaspoon soda
  - 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
  - Pinch of salt
  - 1/2 cup milk
  - 1/2 cup condensed tomato soup (Just as it comes from the can)
  - 2 eggs, separated
  - 3 tablespoons melted shortening
- Sift the flour, measure. Then add soda, baking powder and salt and sift again. Combine the egg yolks, milk and tomato soup and mix with the dry ingredients. Beat the egg whites until stiff. Fold them into the mixture then add the melted shortening. This makes 3 to 4 large waffles. Serve with crisp bacon strips.

## Second Victory Garden Conference Soon at OSC

The second annual victory garden conference to lay plans for continuing war-time expansion of home production of vegetables and small fruits has been called by William A. Schoenfeld, dean and director of agriculture, to meet at Oregon State college Friday, December 4. Representatives of 16 state organizations, associations, and councils have been invited to participate with the O.S.C. Extension service in the conference. These include state-wide farm organizations, federal and state agricultural agencies, and labor organizations, as well as consumer and home interest groups.

The 1942 Oregon victory garden program has been remarkably successful, says Dean Schoenfeld, but a still greater need looms for more victory gardens in 1943. It is hoped that out of the experiences of the past year considerable improvement can be included in the program for the coming year.

The program for the conference calls for discussions during the forenoon session, followed by appointment of working committees to meet in the early afternoon, and the adoption of their reports comprising a complete program.
