Motor Bus Reserve Driver

In case of an emergency requiring mass troop transport to threatened points on the Pacific Coast, the Motor Bus Reserve would spring into action as an auxiliary of the regular army. Fleets of swift, streamlined motor buses, operated by personnel already trained in troop transport, would be immediately available to move thousands of soldiers quickly and efficiently.

Pacific Greyhound Lines has organized a number of Motor Bus Reserve units to serve the important military and population centers of the Coast. A unit is composed of 55 drivers and officers, 24 buses, 3 reserve buses, a maintenance section consisting of 2 light trucks, a wrecker, a tank truck for reserve fuel and oil, automobiles for the officers and 2 motorcycles for runners. Each unit provides seats for an infantry battalion. The men volunteer their services and Greyhound furnishes the buses without charge to the Army for training.

In addition to the Motor Bus Reserve, buses are contributing to the war effort in many other ways; carrying military men to and from camps and bases, providing vital service to many war production plants. In fact, the motor bus is a tremendous new force for victory that grew up after World War I to serve the nation in peace and now is extending its vast facilities to serve the nation at war.

Garden Pest Control Explained in Bulletin

The latest and most up-to-date guide for vegetable garden insect pest control for Oregon gardeners is extension bulletin 551, which has been issued in large enough numbers to supply any victory gardener who requests it. This bulletin contains a control chart, on which are listed both the various crops and the insects attacking them. News service, Oregon State College, Corvallis, Ore.

Three Quarantines Lifted Entirely

Three quarantines will be wiped off the Oregon books entirely on April 20, when orders drawn by the State Department of Agriculture and signed by the Governor became effective. One lifts the peach mosaic quarantine against other states. The other two remove the interstate and the intrastate quarantines against the satin moth.

Repeat of the satin moth quarantines is justified on basis that the parasite introduced to hold it down has done so, thereby wiping out any economic loss; uniform quarantines in states wherein the peach mosaic is found protect Oregon adequately from introduction of this pest.

LIVER AND BACON ROLLS

Simmer 1 pound sliced liver for about 5-8 minutes. Grind liver and combine with 1/2 cup bread crumbs, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon sage, 1/4 cup liquid (milk or water) and 1 egg. Mix thoroughly.



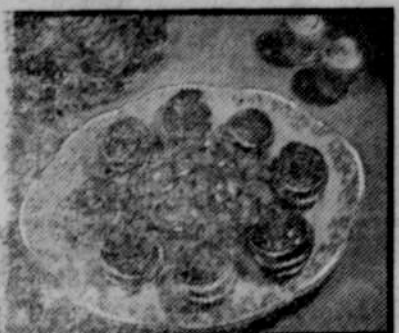
Making the Rolls

Arrange one-half pound bacon in a piece of waxed paper, slightly overlapping the slices. Spread the liver mixture evenly over the back of the slices. Roll like a jelly roll so the ends of the slices of bacon are rolled in with the liver.



Slicing the Roll

Place wooden picks along the edge of the roll at 1-inch intervals to hold the bacon in place. Slice 1-inch thick. Broil or panbroil slowly until brown on both sides (12-15 minutes).



The Finished Rolls

Serve hot with lima beans. Fresh vegetable salad is a good accompaniment.

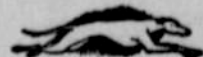
