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SUMMER QUARTER BEGINS JUNE 7 AT SOCE

The summer quarter at the Southern Oregon College of Education opens June 7. President Walter Redford states that because of the exodus of teachers for military service and war industry, many classrooms may be without teachers, and schools are looking to those who have left the profession to marry or to enter other work, and who now, as a wartime service, may return to the classroom.

For those returning to teaching for the duration, the college offers two special refresher courses this summer: "Recent Trends in Primary Education" and "Survey of Modern Practices in Intermediate Grades", in which students may observe modern classroom methods in action at Lincoln Training School and hold daily conference with supervising teachers. Out-of-state teachers may obtain courses required for Oregon certification.

A student beginning teacher training this June can be ready to teach in the fall of 1945. Pres. Redford stated, Two- and three-year graduates of the college may work toward the degree of bachelor of science in elementary education. A high school graduate can complete this summer in the junior college department, the first term of college.
