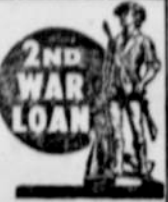

BUY BONDS— SEEK INDUCTION OF SPECIALISTS

Announcement has been made by Lt. Clayton C. Morse, Resident Engineer, U. S. Army Engineer Office at Camp White, Medford, Oregon, that the Corps of Engineers is seeking men in various special trade classifications who may proceed by means of a voluntary induction plan, recently approved by the joint Army-Navy Personnel Board, into construction units in the Corps of Engineers. Nine thousand enlisted specialists per month are needed to make up the construction regiments being formed by the Corps of Engineers which are to carry out the necessary construction work for the successful accomplishment of our offensives carried out by our troops abroad. The Army is not seeking services of men who are at present engaged in essential war work, but it does want to properly classify men who are skilled construction workers in a branch of the service wherein their experience can be put to best use, in the event they are shortly to be inducted, and as the war construction work in this country which is nearing its peak no longer provides employment.

All voluntary enlistments obtained during the campaign will be in the lowest enlisted grade. However, it was pointed out that men possessing construction experience and assigned to construction duties in the army will have greater opportunity to advance through the ranks. Those displaying outstanding leadership qualities will be selected to attend Officer Candidate Schools and upon completion of the course, receive commissions as second lieutenants in the Corps of Engineers.

The following is a list of specialties in which the Corps of Engineers is currently seeking men: automobile mechanic, blastman or powderman, bridge builder, construction carpenter, construction foreman, power shovel operator, electrician, operating engineer, water supply filter operator, machine shop foreman, utility repairman, rigger, tractor driver, tractor mechanic, quarryman, jackhammer operator, heavy construction equipment operator, railway section foreman, well driller, motorboat operator, lumberjack, sawyer, lumber grader, sawmill millwright, timber cruiser.

Interested men are requested to forward an application which can be supplied by the Resident Engineer, Lt. Clayton C. Morse, P. O. Box 832, Medford, or from the Office of the District Engineer, Portland. Upon the basis of this application, the District Engineer, Pacific Division, will issue a letter which the individual will present at the Armed Forces Induction Center nearest his home, directing his assignment to the Corps of Engineers.

Landlords Warned All Rental Housing Must Be Registered

Walter J. Looker, Rent Director for the Area covering Jackson County, today called attention to the fact that some landlords in this area who have not complied with the legal requirement that all property rented for dwelling accommodations must be registered with the OPA.

"It is extremely important," Mr. Looker stated, "that all landlords fully understand their duty in this respect, and that any who have not registered do so immediately." "Some landlords," he added, "possibly because of the ignorance of the law, have failed to register with OPA." "These landlords," he said, "should register immediately in order to avoid the serious penalties which result from failure to register."

Mr. Looker observed that many people are now renting furnished rooms, who never did before; and some of them are not aware of the fact that they must register these rooms just as any other owners of rented property must register.

In the case of rooms or any other living accommodations first rented after October 1, 1942, they are required to be registered within 30 days after they are first rented in the cases of houses, flats, apartments, and rooms, and within 35 days in the case of hotels and rooming houses. "All persons who have failed to register because of ignorance or mistake, or for any other reason, should do so immediately, in order to avoid serious penalties," he said.

Emigration to Oregon in 1843

In the spring of 1843 nomadic Americans began to assemble at Independence, Missouri, for the long trek to the Oregon Country. There were several answers as to why they left their established homes to travel two thousand miles to a yet unbroken country. Perhaps Jesse Applegate's answer is as good as any: "It was destiny."

Approximately one thousand Americans, were men of affairs who made their mark in the far west: the Applegates, Hembrees, Keyzers, Martins and Fords; James Nesmith, who became a U. S. Senator; Peter Burnett, who became the first Governor of California; M. M. McCarver, townsman promoter and many others.

Forty miles out of Independence, they came to the forks of the road. The Santa Fe Trail led to the Southwest—a crude signboard pointed to the Northwest, and read, "Road to Oregon." It pointed the way two thousand miles. There were no other signs and none was needed.

The emigrants were young men and women who had burned their bridges behind them and had turned their faces resolutely toward the west. The wagons were light and strong and canvas-covered. The motive power was horses, mules and oxen. Food, clothing, articles for trade with the Indians, medicine and household articles were carried in the wagons which were to be their homes for the next five or six months. The earth was to be bed and the sky their roof.

There was no hesitating at the signboard. Captain Gantt, the guide, reined his horse toward the Northwest and the Great Migration of 1843 was on its way to the Oregon Country.

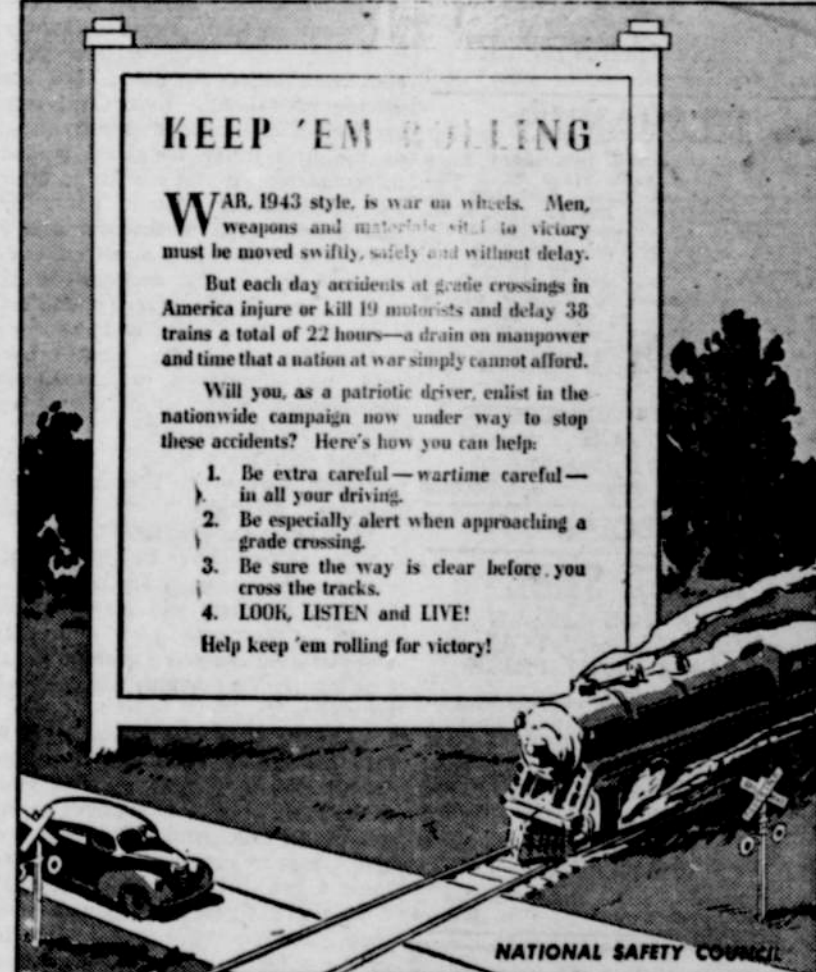
