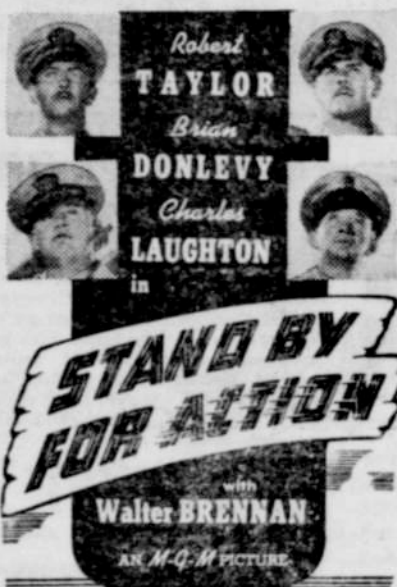

OSC BULLETIN GUIDE FOR GROWING LATE VEGETABLES

A revised bulletin on growing
fall and early winter vegetables
has just been issued by the OSC
Extension service intended to
serve as a guide in replacing first
early garden crops with later sum-
mer growing vegetables.

Early June through July is the
time for the seeding of many of
these late vegetables, while from
June 15 to August 1 are the us-
ual dates for transplanting many
of them. By following a planting
table contained in the bulletin, a
succession of vegetables may be
maintained that will keep the gar-
den continually productive
through the fall and early winter
months, says A. G. B. Bouquet,
vegetable crop specialist and au-
thor of the bulletin.

RAILS NEED MEN AND LOCOMOTIVES
