

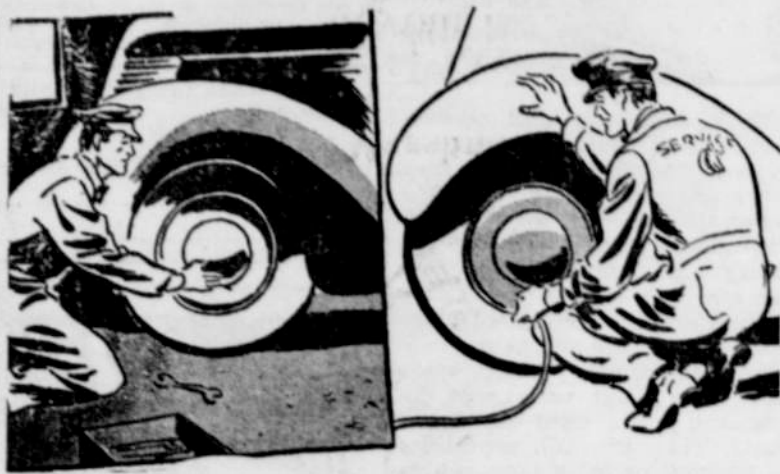
VESTAL VISITS SOCE
