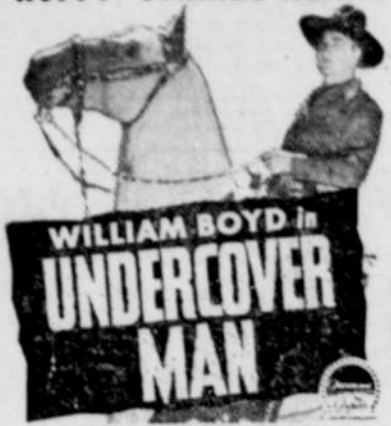

OUTDOOR SPORTS POPULAR AT ASHLAND USO

Sunday evening buffet supper at the USO was enjoyed by 95 men and a number of junior hostesses. Ham and deviled egg sandwiches, coffee and fruit salad, were served.

Around 200 partook of the Saturday evening cook-your-own-supper, which was followed by an evening of lively dancing.

INCREASING NEED FOR WAACS IN SERVICE

Proclaiming that Oregon has a big job to do if it is to recruit its share of the 90,000 additional women needed for the WAAC, Colonel J. J. Fulmer, state recruiting chief, urged all eligible women in this district to give immediate consideration to the opportunities for service offered by the rapidly growing feminine army.

Now that women soldiers have actually proved their ability to perform non-combat duties, explains the colonel, the demand for their services has increased tremendously. WAACS are now stationed at army installations throughout the United States and in England and Africa.

USO SPONSORS HANDICRAFT COURSE

The Ashland USO is sponsoring an Ashland-hostess course in handicrafts, being taught now in Medford. In the first Ashland group to attend last Thursday evening were Mrs. L. P. Wilmet, Miss Florence Wood, Mrs. Emil Krueger, Miss Elizabeth Cunningham, and Miss Adra Geoller.

The course is for volunteer leaders' training, and will meet three more times, June 29, July 1, and 6. The group receiving this training in handicraft will pass on their skill to soldiers, soldiers' wives, and USO hostesses, later in the year when indoor leisure replaces outdoor activities. Training includes exercises in simple wood and leather tooling, stenciling, drafting, all directed toward constructing useful and interesting gadgets such as greeting cards, folders, book holders, and the like.

Mrs. Bayonne Glenn, who is sponsoring the movement in Ashland, will answer inquiries of anyone interested in taking the work.
