Nature's Signposts

Nature provided enduring signposts along the route of the Old Oregon Trail for the guidance of travelers. First of those strange freaks of nature looked, from a distance, like a mighty structure, causing the beholders to liken it to a courthouse, so it was given the name "Courthouse Rock." Near by was a smaller formation, which was named "Jail Rock." Perhaps the most striking and peculiar landmark on the Trail was Chimney Rock, which could be seen for many miles, a beacon rock and guide for all travelers. It is located across the Platte River from Bayard, Neb. It is 500 feet in diameter at its base, rises cone-shaped for about 300 feet, then a tall spire rises another 200 feet.

The children of the train expected to see smoke coming out of it and were quite disappointed that none did. Next came Castle Rock, near the present McGrew, Neb. That rock is 1500 by 2000 feet at the base and rises 700 feet above the Platte River. It looked like a castle and romantic persons expected to see the gates of the castle fly open and mailed knights ride out on horseback.

Then appeared the famous, imposing landmark known as Scott's Bluff. It was named for a trapper and named Hiram Scott, who was wounded by Indians and who crawled for many miles to the shadow of the bluff to die. This famous bluff is 3700 feet in width at its base and rises 800 feet above the Platte River.

The United States Government has taken over this historic landmark and it is now a national monument. A road passes through three tunnels to its summit where a gorgeous panorama of the surrounding valley and hills can be seen.

'We Mutually Pledge'

One hundred and sixty-seven years ago this Fourth of July there rang forth upon a then unheeding world the "unanimous declaration of the 13 United States of America."

At that time, though bells rang and crowds in the streets of Philadelphia cheered, only a few far-seeing individuals realized the true significance of the Declaration of Independence. To the rest of the world the proclamation was mere words.

But these "words" made a nation, and, more than a nation, they made a way of life. They were the clarion call which proclaimed not merely a revolution against a constituted authority. They were a challenge to return to first principles—to the basic ideal of the great monotheistic religions, Christianity and Judaism—that "all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights..."

In this Declaration, the thoughtful, conscientious men, whom we call the founding fathers, affirmed what has come to be called "Americanism," the spirit which animates and unifies this nation composed of so many divergent and different racial, national and religious groups. They proclaimed the philosophy that the people should and could govern themselves, and that by working together in a spirit of equality, they could insure to themselves and to each other the unalienable rights of "life, lib-

With this spirit we shall win, and in the winning retain our democratic way of life for all the generations to come.
