Greyhound Urges Men Join Seabees

If you are a skilled American
construction worker, you can help
win the war by joining the Navy's
building-fighting Seabees. Thou-
sands more of such men are needed
at once.

Such is the message carried in
current Greyhound advertise-
ments appearing in more than 500
newspapers of California, Oregon,
Nevada, Arizona, Utah, New Mex-
ico and parts of Texas. This wide
newspaper coverage in the West
was decided upon due to the ur-
gency of the situation and to the
fact that, with the Axis reeling
under repeated Allied blows, the
time to strike is when the iron is
hot. And the Seabees, it was
pointed out, can help deliver the
"Sunday punch."

"Follow your trade in the
Navy," says Greyhound. "For men
who itch to get in the thick of
things, the Seabees offer action.
They're a tough, hard-hitting or-
ganization of specialists who build
bases and help hold them, repair
battle-damaged ships and other
Navy equipment, back up the

Mechanics, carpenters, electri-

cruiting Station at U. S. Court
House and Post Office, Medford,
Oregon.

In devoting its advertising
space to the Seabees, Greyhound

Pot Scourers Included In New Housewares

Metal pot scourers, flour sieves,
carpet sweepers and some similar
household items that have almost
disappeared from the stores will
be available again as the result of
recent action by the War Produc-
tion board in allowing additional
manufacturing of 10 of the most
needed articles, says Miss Lois
A. Lutz, extension specialist in
home management at Oregon
State college.

The extensive shortages of these
items, coupled with the fact that
small quantities of iron and steel,
not suitable for military produc-
tion can be used has led to relaxa-
tion of the restrictions, she says.

Actual volume of production
will depend upon the amounts of
critical materials available after
the war programs have received
their requirements. While a top
limit has been set by the WPB,
the quotas may not be obtained
unless enough materials are avail-
able.

Among other items of the new
permit list are blue steel house-
hold baking pans, food choppers
or grinders, jar wrenches, house-
hold and institutional type can
openers and vacuum bottles.

Of exceptional interest to home-
makers is the provision allowing
production of needed wire over
from wire scrap, Miss Lutz points
out. Odds and ends of needed wire
left over from the manufacture of
oil filters for jeeps, trucks, planes
and similar equipment can be
rolled up and tied together to
make a serviceable pot scourer.

No other use has been found for
this scrap, while housewives have
been clamoring for something to
take the place of the now unob-
tainable steel wool.

GOVT. NEEDS MEN FOR WAR SERVICE

From the Eleventh United
States Civil Service Region office
at 326 Post Office Building, Seat-
tle 1, Washington comes the call
for men needed in Wartime ser-
vice.

A Junior Investigator at \$2432
per year is needed in the Office of
Price Administration, Klamath
Falls, Oregon Area and Associate
Price Specialists at \$3826 per year
are needed for Office of Price Ad-
ministration, State of Oregon and
the counties of Wahiakum, Cow-
litz, Clark, Skamania, and Klick-
itat, State of Washington.

GOVERNMENT EXPECTED TO GET ARMY TURKEYS SOON

The government freeze on tur-
keys while 10 million pounds are
obtained for the armed forces is
not expected to extend much be-
yond October 1, according to in-
formation received by the Exten-
sion service at Oregon State col-
lege. In the first two weeks that
the order was in effect approxi-
mately 1,750,000 pounds were ob-
tained for delivery by September
15.

Some changes in weight limits
have been made so that now the
army will take hens weighing
eight pounds and up, while toms
will be accepted from 14 to 20
pounds. Previous limits were be-
tween 8 and 16 pounds.

Purchasers for the government
are authorized to pay from 39 to
41½ cents for No. 1 birds of the
various classes delivered in Port-
land. Procedure in case of rejec-
tions has also been worked out.

All restrictions will be lifted
just as soon as the government's
10 million pounds have been ar-
ranged for, the announcement
from the War Food Administra-
tion says.

FAT CHECK FOR WATER

Medford has received from the
government \$40,875 for city water
furnished Camp White during the
year ending June 30. The camp
uses about 1,914,000 gallons of
water daily.
