NEW STATUS FOR WOMEN IN ARMY

When on September 1st, the WAACS drop and "A" to become the Women's Army Corps and thus share full membership in the Army of the United States they will be entitled to all the privileges and facilities offered male members of the service.

In answer to many queries as to just what these new "army status" privileges for WAACS would be, Colonel J. J. Fulmer, Oregon recruiting officer, gave out the following information:

As feminine soldiers all enlisted and commissioned personnel of the women's army will be entitled to free postage, up to \$10,000 worth of National Service life insurance, actual operations duties for officers, additional pay for overseas service, 30 days leave or furlough a year, complete clothing issue for enlisted women and a \$250.00 clothing allowance for officers, same rank and grade as men, Army Emergency Relief, and a much wider variety of interesting non-combat assignments.

The "WAAC to WAC" change also includes qualifying women from 20 to 50 years for enlistment in the corps, whereas enrollment was formerly offered to women from 21 to 45 only. Applicants under the age of 21, however, must have the written consent of their parents or guardians before their enlistment can be completed.

Plans to Contact Oregon Farmers Oregon farmers will have an important role in the Third War Loan drive. Plans which call for the personal solicitation of every farmer in the state are being formulated, according to E. C. Sammons, state chairman of the Oregon War Finance Committee.

Under the direction of Burt K. Snyder, newly appointed to head the agricultural division, a new farm program is being developed to the point where there will be at least one representative for each ten farms to be contacted. Realizing the farm labor shortage, county organizations will provide farm-to-farm solicitors who will canvass every farmer in the state and enable him to purchase war bonds without the necessity of travelling to neighboring towns to conduct this business.

PLANS TO CONTACT OREGON FARMERS

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"The war bond program is made to order for Oregon farmers," says Snyder. "At present farmers are unable to buy much of the equipment they would like to have on their farms and in their homes. The war bond program offers a safe investment at good interest for all available funds."

Treasury research indicates that farmers constitute the largest untapped market for war bonds in the U.S.A. In the past the difficulty has been inability to reach the farmer. Under the new program farmers will be called upon personally and given an opportunity to buy bonds.
