**Points on Preparing
Farm Tax Returns**

A larger number of Oregon
farmers than ever before are go-
ing to be faced with the necessity
of turning in an income tax esti-
mate between now and December
15, points out the farm manage-
ment department at Oregon State
College.

Under the pay-as-you-go pro-
vision of the 1943 law, persons
who receive as much as \$100 in-
come from sources on which there
is no withholding must submit a
declaration provided their total
income from all sources exceeds
\$500 for single persons and \$624
for married persons. The tax law
itself provides that all farmers
must file a return if gross income
is \$500 or more for single persons,
or \$1200 if married.

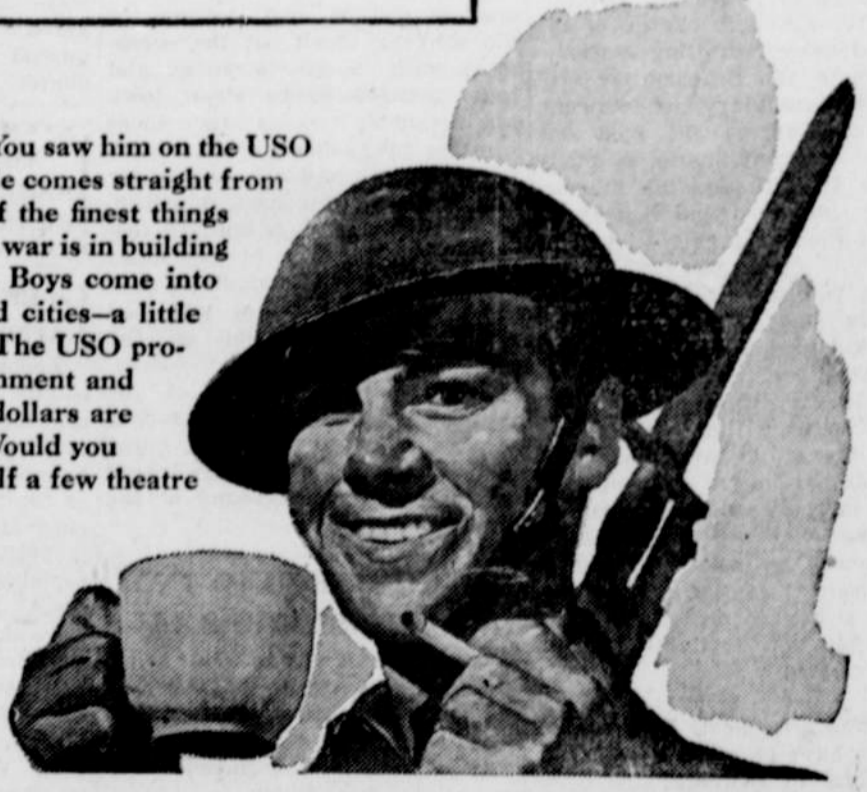


This Chinese baby didn't have much, but yesterday
