Spanish "Thanks" Letter Give Visiting Mexicans

When the 3000 or so Mexicans who have been in Oregon helping with the harvest of crops return to their homeland this fall each will carry with him a letter of greeting and gratitude signed jointly by Governor Earl Snell and William A. Schoenfeld, dean of agriculture at Oregon State college. Furthermore, the letter is printed in Spanish and contains on the reverse side two Oregon pictures, one of the state capitol and the other of agriculture hall on the campus.

This is the first year that Mexican nationals were brought into Oregon as farm workers. Their presence has been a valuable supplement to the local labor of neighbors and of city women and children in making possible the

successful harvesting of huge crops this year, according to J. R. Beck, state supervisor of the emergency farm labor service in the Extension service.

The letter in part follows: "Neighbors of the Republic of Mexico, Greetings: The farmers of the state of Oregon salute you. They are grateful to you and your fellow countrymen who have labored in the production and harvest of the crops of this country. We hope that your associations here have been congenial and that you have found it as profitable to you as it has been to us. . . If similar cooperation in the war effort should seem desirable again, we would consider it a privilege to welcome you back to this state."

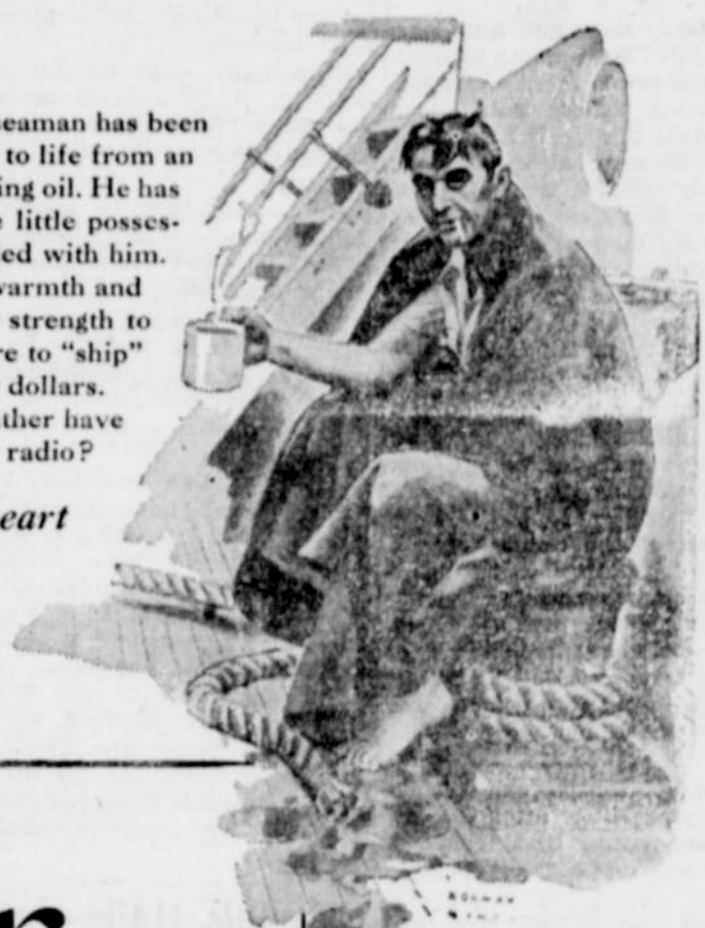

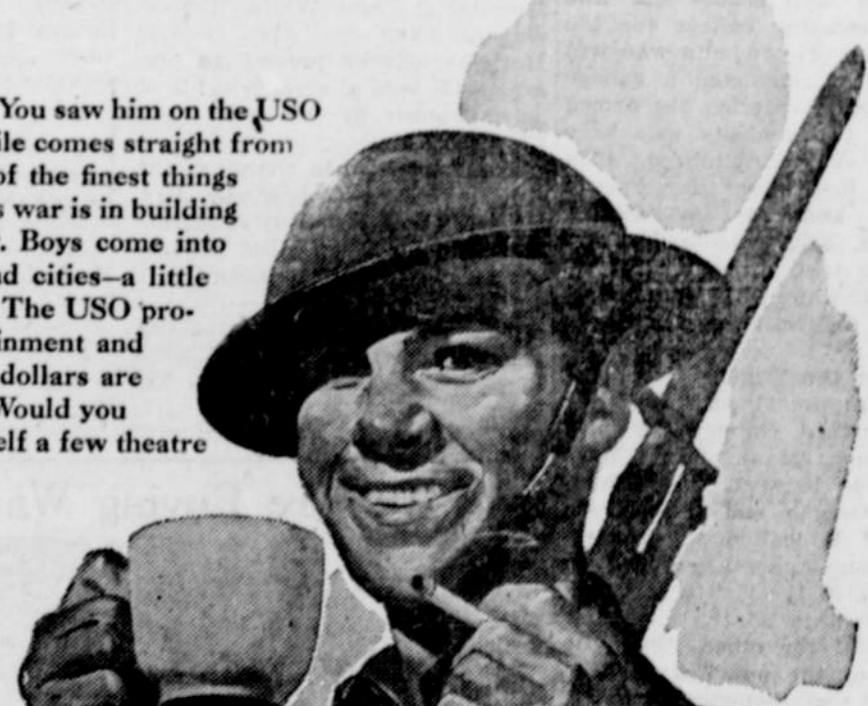
