Ration-Time RECIPES

These Butterscotch Squares are just the thing to serve with lunch, tea or after dinner with coffee. Also good for the cookie jar:

BUTTERSCOTCH SQUARES

1/4 cup margarine
1 cup brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 egg
1 cup sifted flour
1 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon vanilla
1/4 cup pecan meats

Cream together margarine, sugar, and salt. Blend in beaten egg. Add flour and baking powder sifted together. Then add nut meats and vanilla and spread the mixture in a lightly greased shallow pan (about 9-inch square). Bake in a moderate oven (350°F) 25 to 30 minutes. While hot, cut into strips about an inch wide and three inches long.
