Emigrant Wagons

The name Malheur is made up of two French words, "mal" meaning bad or evil and "heur" by the Indians.

Leaving the Malheur, the Trail after graduation went to complete at the home of Mrs. Reba Kelsey, turned north coming again upon his course at the State College 165 No. Main, Friday afternoon the Snake river near where Olds in Corvalils.

Ferry was established in the "sixties" to handle the travel to the gold mines of the Boise Basin. The Trail continued along the Snake to where the river entered a deep, narrow canyon and flowed in a northerly direction to become the boundary line between Oregon and Idaho for two hundred and twenty-five miles .The point where the Trail left the river was called Farewell Bend, a short sweep of the river with low banks, affording an easy crossing, where the emigrants departed the river without regret. The Trail climbed the easy slope of foothills, and dropped into a little valley on the Burnt river at the site of the present

Huntington, Oregon. Burnt River was so named by Peter Skene Ogden in 1825 on account of the burned timber he had found on its upper reaches.

It was now September 23rd. The emigrants made camp and rested preparatory to another arduous journey through and over high, forbidding hills which towered above them.
