MANY WAR PRISONERS FOUND STRONG NAZIS

DALLAS, TEXAS—The Dallas News quotes First Lieutenant Maurice M. Hall, chaplain of a prisoners of war camp at Huntsville, Texas, as saying that "60% of the prisoners are confirmed Nazis," and "you might as well preach Christianity to a wall as to these Hitlerites."

"The Nazis are treacherous, often trying after midnight in the barracks to lynch their comrades who are not Nazis," he was quoted in an interview.

"Unless we evangelize these men they will return to Germany after the war with nothing but contempt for our ideals, more than eager to fight another war."

Master Sergeant Meredith E. Durham received his awards for extraordinary achievement in the Southwest Pacific theater of operations during the first year of war against Japan.

Grants Pass—Allen H. (Jack) Cooley, Grants Pass rancher died here Thursday of injuries suffered in a tumble from the third story window of an Ashland hotel Sunday, November 14.

Survivors are the widow, Jessie; a stepson, James McGuire, now at a Florida air base; a sister, Mrs. Grace Collins, Medford, and a brother, Charles R. Cooley, president of a Grants Pass lumber company and owner of the Ashland hotel where the accident occurred.

Cooley was buried here Saturday.
