Fold sheets, towels, overalls and pajamas as they come off the line; buy knitted underwear which doesn't need ironing; rearrange the kitchen so unnecessary steps will be eliminated. Other time-savers are baking in glass or pottery dishes that can be also used for serving at the table, providing low hooks so children can hang up their own clothing, and using table mats that can be wiped off with a damp cloth so as to keep them clean.
