S. S. "Pendleton" To Be Launched

American Indians engaged in war production will be saluted at the launching of the S. S. Pendleton, Swan Island's forty-ninth T2-SE-A1 tanker, at 11:30 a. m. on Friday, January 21, 1944.

The sponsor of the vessel, Princess Ta-la-we-ton-mi ("Reflection of Dawn"), is probably better known as Melissa Parr of renowned beauty, and the only Indian girl ever to be chosen queen of the world-famous Pendleton Round-up. She is a full-blooded Umatilla Indian of the Cayuse Tribe, descendant of Chief Joseph and a niece of Chief George Redhawk.

The sponsor, Princess Te-la-we-ton-mi, will be attended by How-la-wi-non-mi ("Wandering Star"), daughter of Chief Minthorn and granddaughter of Chief Alan Batawa, and by Ti-ma-pim-ti-ect ("Glimmer of Twilight"), daughter of the sponsor, Melissa Parr. The flower girl is Kin-ne-tuss ("Twinkling Eyes"), daughter of Mrs. Dan McKay and descendant of the famous Indian Doctor McKay.

The Reverend Earl Cochran of the Pendleton Presbyterian Church will invoke the blessing of God upon the vessel.

Indian workers of Swan Island will be honored guests at the launching, and also the sponsor's luncheon which follows. A real Western flavor will be added to the ceremonies by the Round-up Quartette and a host of Pendleton citizens togged out in Western style. Wigwags will be in evidence in the yard prior to the launching, and the Indians will all be dressed in tribal regalia. A large group of Indians of the Chemawa Indian School at Salem will witness the ceremonies.

The Honorable Sprague M. Carter, Mayor of Pendleton, will head a large delegation of Round-Up personnel and prominent citizens of Pendleton in Umatilla County.

The ship is named in honor of Pendleton, the county seat of Umatilla County, and a famous point in the Old Oregon Trail. The center of a large wheat-growing area, Pendleton is probably best known for the Round-Up, an annual event to select world champion cowboys. The city was named in honor of a vice presidential candidate in 1868, and soon became the center of a Western cattle industry.

BABY SMOTHERER ASKS FOR PARDON

Bernard J. Lotka, 23, of Medford, convicted of smothering his infant son to death, is appealing to the Governor for a pardon.

Lotka and his common-law wife, Tillie Michalski, were indicted for the baby's death. Miss Michalski was acquitted. Lotka, then a sergeant at Camp White, was found guilty of second degree murder.

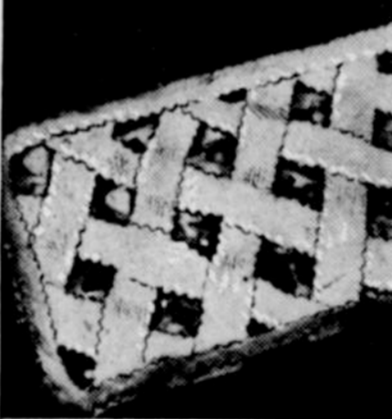
He is serving a life sentence at the State Penitentiary.

Ration Time RECIPES



Vitamin-rich pork is combined with apples to make this economical, yet savory and delicious dish.

PORK AND APPLE PIE

- 2 cups cooked pork (cut in cubes)
- 2 medium sized tart apples (cored and sliced)
- 1 cup left-over gravy or thickened consommé

In a shallow baking dish, arrange alternate layers of pork and apples. Season each layer with a little salt and pepper. Pour over gravy. Top with strips of pastry made by blending 1/2 cup margarine with 1 1/2 cups flour and 1/2 teaspoon salt. Add water to form stiff dough. Roll out to a sheet. Cut into strips. Bake in hot oven (400°F).
