



Gen. H. H. Arnold, chief of Army Air Forces, at the annual meeting of the Amer.can Society of Photogrammetrists. Donor of the award is Sherman M. Fairchild, chairman of the board of Fairchild Aviation Corporation, who, through his experiments in designing an improved between-thelens camera shutter, and new types of aerial cameras, opened a wide new field for aerial photographers, whose work has been one of the biggest single factors contributing to American success in this war.

Col. FitzGerald began his long career with the government as a 19-year-old temporary field assistant with the U.S. Geologica Survey, and he was employed it the surveys until 1942. He had joined the Alaskan branch in 102 and rose to senior topographic engineer in 1938. On June 8, 1942 he was commiss'oned as major in the Army Air Forces and pro moted to lieutenant-colonel in January, 1943. He is now chief of the aeronautical chart service of the Army Air Forces.
