ON BEING WELL-BRED

Conventions are the hall marks of civilized living. They are the traffic rules which man has adopted for the better conduct of his life. Their observance is the card proving his right to membership in civilized society.
There is no law against pushing your neighbor aside in the street, but if you do so, you prove yourself a boor. There is no law against eating peas with a knife - but if you do, you mark yourself ill-bred and unused to the amenities of civilized society. There is no law against discourtesy - but it just isn't practiced by the kind of people you want to know.
Conventions are designed for the protection of all. The common usages of society are ingrained in children from their earliest contacts with those around them. We do not condemn a child himself for his bad manners, but we do comment caustically upon his home environment.
To those conventions with which we are all conversant, should now be added a new one. A person who condemns another not the groups from which he comes, as an individual but because of should be considered as guilty of bad breeding as he who transgresses any of the other more material conventions. It just isn't American, and it just isn't done by ladies and gentlemen in America. We should hold it important to be kind as to be courteous, to speak fairly as well as truthfully, to respect our neighbors' beliefs as we respect his possessions.
We are now entering on one of the most trying years in which material life - a year in which the crescendo of war will mean greater stress upon our own tempers, greater strains upon our mental balance as the casualty lists roll in, in addition to the bitter fight of a national election.
Let us resolve to conduct ourselves as well-bred people during this trying time. Let us be good American ladies and gentlemen first and set a seal upon our lips. Arguing as hotly as we will, let us observe the canons of fair play and decent speech and not indulge in generalized charges against anyone, nor in mass condemnation of any group within our nation, nor in vitriolic attacks on any race, religion, class or color.
Observing at all times the conventions of society let us prove to the world that the democratic form of government with its freedom of speech for all people can still be not only the most civilized but the best bred form of government.

USO Celebrates Third Birthday

USO tomorrow celebrates its third anniversary with 2809 clubs and other service units in operation in the United States and hemisphere bases, according to a report received today by Charles I. Barnard, president of USO, which is a member agency of the National War Fund.

"Three years ago, USO was only a hope in the hearts of a handful of men and women," said a message to Mr. Sprague from Mr. Barnard. "Today it has close to 3000 operating units serving the fighting forces and the forces behind the lines all over the Western Hemisphere. And the troupes of USO-Camp shows are playing in every combat zone around the world."

"Practically all Americans have joined in making the USO what it is—a people's service to its fighting forces—by giving generously to USO. Every dollar USO has received has come as a voluntary contribution from the American people, made through such organized effort as Oregon War Chest.

"As USO observes its Third Anniversary, it gratefully acknowledges the support and co-operation of millions of friends." The report to Mr. Sprague shows that the American public contributed \$14,000,000 in USO's first year to operate 554 units; \$34,000,000 in its second year to operate 1615 units and \$61,000,000 in the third year to operate 2809 units.

The convention will bring together delegates from 35 states and 600 local leagues to appraise current needs and to plan the coming two years' activity—two years that will round out a quarter century of activity for the League of Women Voters, and that league members recognize as possibly the most crucial years in United States history.
