- Cauliflower
- Margarine
- Cooked carrot strips
- Salt, pepper
- Tomatoes
- Whole kernel corn, canned or fresh cooked

Cook the cauliflower whole, without removing all of the small tender leaves. Drain well and place in the center of a serving tray or chop plate. Season with a generous amount of softened margarine. Surround with cooked carrot strips tossed in melted margarine; and baked tomatoes with part of the centers scooped out and filled with corn seasoned with salt, pepper and melted margarine.

MADE AVAILABLE

The Oregon Mothers' Exclusive Board, at a meeting held on the University of Oregon campus last week, voted to continue the \$500 in scholarships offered for several years. The Patronella G. Peet's scholarship of \$200 will be awarded again for next year, together with two others for \$150 each.

These scholarships will be open to graduates of Oregon high schools, who may apply during their senior year or the year following their graduation. Applications are to be made to Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel administration, not later than April 1.

OREGON HOST TO VICTORY GARDEN CONFAB FEB. 10-11

Oregon will be host to victory garden leaders of the four states of Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon at a regional meeting called for Portland February 10 and 11 by the Federal Co-operative Extension Service. Details of the meeting have been arranged by extension officials at Oregon State College, who have selected the Imperial Hotel as the place of meeting.
