JAMES L. KRAFT RECEIVES AWARD

One thousand Protestant church leaders throughout the country have selected James L. Kraft, Chicago industrialist, as the winner of the first national Russell Colgate Distinguished Service Citation for his "outstanding contributions to the advancement of Christian education through personal leadership and influence."

The award was made by the International Council of Religious Education at a fellowship luncheon in the Stevens Hotel here, February 8, during the 22nd annual meeting of the Council, it nas been announced by Dr. Roy G. Ross, general secretary. As a memorial for the late Russell Colgate, president of the International Council until his death in 1941. the citation consists of a handlettered certificate and a medal, which was presented to Mr. Kraft by Dr. Arlo Ayres Brown of Madison, N. J., chairman of the Council.

"The selection of Mr. Kraft for this honor is a distinct recognition of his personal leadership for many years in Christian education," Dr. Ross declared in making the announcement. "Religious educators of the United States and Canada know Mr. Kraft as an untiring worker in Christian education and as a staunch lav friend.
