Irrigation Water Outlook Poor in Parts of Oregon

Oregon irrigation users are hoping for above normal mountain snowfall in the remainder of February and March because without it they face an unusually meager water supply in most sections.

The preliminary water supply forecast just issued by R. A. Work of Medford shows the prospects as of February 1 were not good. Work is in charge of the Oregon cooperative snow surveys in Oregon for the Soil Conservation service, the O.S.C. experiment station, and other cooperating agencies. Later forecasts will be issued early March and April. "Irrigated lands now having in sight good to fair water supplies are chiefly those served from reservoirs containing substantial holdover from the bountiful 1943 runoff." Work reports. "Mountain snow cover was considerably below average on nearly all snow courses on February 1."

Work adds that if snowfall during the next two months is normal or less, the stream flow during irrigation season is almost sure to be below normal. There fore, above normal snow additions during February and March are needed if adequate stream flow is to be produced.

Another complicating factor is that watershed soils that have little or no snow are frozen to a greater depth than usual, particularly in eastern Oregon. Even with additional snow this will favor a rapid early runoff, with consequent greater reservoir storage, but unfavorable stream flow later in the season.

The brightest irrigation prospects at this time are in the Klamath and eastern Malheur county regions, where abundant reservoir storage is assured to meet all needs. Total water stored in all reservoirs is 20 per cent less than at a corresponding date last year. It is, however, greater than this date in 1941 or 1940. Furthermore, the number of reservoirs half full or better is only slightly fewer than last year and more than in the previous three years.

First Dive-Bomber
