Medical Progress No Accident

Too little is heard these days about the record of medical men in bringing modern medicine to every part of the country. Accident cases in mountain logging camps, injury and illness in remote ranching sections, auto accidents on the desert, miles from metropolitan centers, requiring prompt, highly skilled surgical care — do our social reformers occasionally wonder how such incidents are cared for?

This is a big country. It is not chance alone that has placed the last word in medical equipment and technique within reach of nearly every emergency. The doctors, in cooperation with local communities, have been largely responsible. But they could not have done it without the help of a central medical organization constantly disseminating the results of scientific research and discovery.

That organization has been the American Medical Association. Of its task, Hygeia has this to say: "The changes of a developing civilization, great as they have been, are slight compared to the prodigious advances in medical science, largely in the last half century. It is this circumstance of prodigious medical advance on which the American Medical Association was built. (It) educates its members — through meetings, exhibits, its many periodicals, its councils and its committees and in many other ways. . . . The benefits of all these activities have been passed on to the public — the ultimate consumer."

Medical science in this country has not "just grown." It was created and made available to all by the American medical system.
