Clarence Fomes and daughter, Clarier and Shirley Hutchenson visited in Talent, Sunday afternoon.

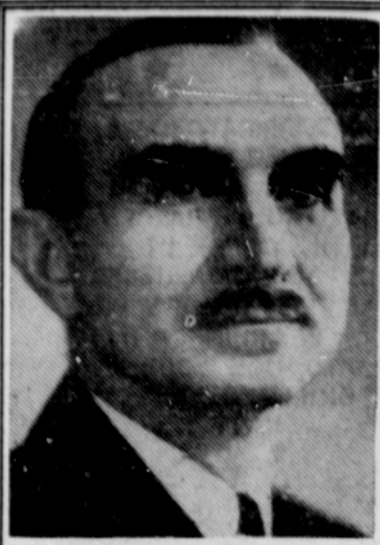
Mrs. Martha Jenkins, a former resident of Talent, passed away at her home in Roseburg, Saturday.

Railroads, Shippers Wage War on Waste

Careless, unpatriotic waste—damage caused by improper packaging and handling of shipments—must be eliminated in these war times, declare the Regional Shippers' Advisory Boards with announcement of a "Perfect Shipping" campaign to be conducted throughout the nation in April.

Extra care is imperative because many shippers have to use sub-standard packaging and packing material, and every damaged shipment means not only wasted material but wasted man-hours and wasted transportation, it was pointed out today by K. G. Fagan, superintendent of freight protection for Southern Pacific.

Millions of dollars worth of goods can be saved to help win the war by proper packing, loading and handling, Fagan said. He added, "The task is made more difficult by reason of an all-time record in the volume of traffic handled, and requires the attention and help of all concerned."

TWAIN'S SPIDER WEB

Mark Twain always knew all the answers. Once when he was the editor of a newspaper he received a letter from one of his subscribers who found a spider in his paper. This reader was worried about the incident and wrote to Mark Twain to ask whether it was a sign of good luck or bad. Here is his answer, as published in *Printed Word*, house magazine of the Von Hoffmann Press, St. Louis:

"Dear Subscriber:
"Finding a spider in your paper was neither good luck nor bad luck for you. The spider was merely looking over the paper to see which merchant is not advertising, so that he can go to that store, spin his web across the door, and live a life of undisturbed peace ever afterwards."

Heated Flying Suits

Modern planes depend upon electricity for control in flight as well as the operation of many other pieces of equipment. An interesting piece of equipment recently perfected is an electrically heated flying suit, which is regarded as a necessity on high altitude flights. Without this protection fliers would be extremely uncomfortable and would risk death from exposure. The suit consists of a jacket, trousers, shoes and gloves, and is made of strong and durable fabrics. In order to heat the suit electric circuits are built into the clothing, and by plugging into power lines a constant source of electricity is supplied. This constant source of electrical power is provided by an Aeroelectric power plant, which is actually a flying power station, providing an independent source of electricity not only for heating the suit, but for all the electrical equipment on large planes.
