Book Review Given At WSCS Friday

The postponed meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service of the Methodist Church was held in the church on Friday, April 14.

During the morning session, routine business was transacted and plans were made to assist the Youth Group with the entertainment of the Young People's District Conference which is to be held in the church on Sunday, April 16.

The appreciation of the society was expressed for the very interesting meeting to which it was invited by the Wesleyan Service Guild, at which a report of a recent jurisdictional conference held in Portland was given by Mrs. Everett Faber, who is the president of the Medford Guild. The meeting was adjourned for luncheon, after which the afternoon session was opened by a ten-minute song service led by Mrs. Robert McKay, after which a devotional period was participated in by a number of the members of the society. A very interesting feature of the afternoon session was a book review given by Mrs. G. A. Briscoe, the book reviewed being "Son of the Smokey Sea" by Nutchuck with Alden Hatch. This autobiographical story of a half-Norwegian, half-Eskimo orphan boy who was brought up in the Methodist Mission at Unalak in the Alutian Islands is filled with unbelievable adventure.

Nutchuck spent months working in a sulphur mine at the crater of a live volcano—fishing the stormy waters of the Bering Sea and driving boats through the terrible tide rips that sweep the passes and in the dimly-lit operating room at the mission to which the sick and wounded came. The story of Nutchuck's first trip "outside," the terrific impact of civilization upon a primitive mind, in itself makes a story of difficulties different, though no less arduous than those faced in the arctic seas amid smoking volcanoes.

How Nutchuck eventually went back to the States, to become a well-known pianist, lecturer and artist, furnished an extraordinary chronicle of adventure and the struggle of a man to find himself.

Nutchuck is now with the United States Army.

HOLMAN SEEKS RENOMINATION

development of Oregon's resources and the improvement of its harbors, rivers, ports and highways—the only member from the states of Oregon, California, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Colorado.
