NEED MORE CITY HELP ON OREGON FARMS, '44

More acres of crops in Oregon this year than last with fewer adult farm workers to handle them spells more dependence on women and youths with every crop where they can possibly do the job, says Ralph Beck, state emergency farm labor supervisor for the O. S. C. Extension Service.

Every local adult possible will be recruited, and every transported laborer, including Mexicans, will be obtained that can be, he says. When all this is done there still is bound to be more need for town and city women and youths this year than last, especially in harvest jobs, hence the extension service is planning to recruit thousands more even than responded to the patriotic appeal last season.
