Radio Technician Training Offered

Records for the past 15 months were shattered by Oregon Navy recruiters in April with the enrollment of the largest number of 17-year-old volunteers since February of 1943, according to word just received by Herb Crain of the Medford Navy Recruiting Station.

Part of the credit for the record breaking performance is due to the excellent co-operation given by high school superintendents and principals in the procurement of applicants for the Navy's recently expanded radio technician training program, the recruiter declares.

"School authorities, realizing that this program offers a splendid opportunity for students with the aptitude and training for radio work, are assisting in every way possible to get qualified applicants for this important phase of naval operations," he added.

The recruiters wish to re-emphasize the fact that those of draft age also may apply for "R. T." training. Successful applicants are enrolled as seamen first class—equivalent to corporal—and given approximately ten months of training in radio and electronics at leading colleges and universities throughout the nation. Full details may be obtained at the recruiting station.

As Archibald MacLeish so potently said: "They have used racial hatreds not for the sake of racial hatreds but to destroy the moral order without which the democratic world cannot survive."

Let us face clearly the fact that our adversaries are not only brilliant fighters on the battlefield—but also on that other battlefield which is our mind. If we cannot win there—if we cannot put aside prejudice, self-interest, selfishness, mistrust there—we are betrayed to the enemy. Let us be warned. Let it not happen here!

History records the human race's effort to obtain a greater sense of freedom. All right endeavor is impelled by a desire to overcome that which limits or restricts, and to attain that which brings freedom and liberation. The human race, on its upward march, has instinctively rebelled against anything that would try to take away its religious, political, or economic liberty. This righteous aspiration for freedom is not a mere human hope, but has its basis in divine Truth. In the very beginning of the Bible we learn that "God created the heaven and the earth." We further learn that God said, "Let us make man in our image, after our likeness; and let them have dominion." "Dominion" means "sovereign power"; then man's freedom is a part of the divine order of things—God-bestowed and God established. In our own immortal Declaration of Independence, that charter of American liberty, we read that God has endowed man with inalienable rights, among which are "life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness." Freedom, then, is man's natural status, bestowed on him by his creator.

Christ Jesus Brought Freedom
In looking back upon the lives of those who have been the greatest benefactors of our race, there is one who stands out above them all—our great Master, Jesus the Christ. He possessed and demonstrated a greater measure of freedom than anyone who has ever lived. He overcame and destroyed every form of bondage that flesh is heir to. He completely annulled the seemingly fetters of sin, poverty, heredity, disease, discord, and even triumphed over death itself. It made no difference whether he was in a raging storm, whether he was confronted by an angry mob, seeming lack, contagious disease, or imminent death; he experienced complete immunity and freedom from evil. False theology has taught us that he was endowed with some supernatural power which made this possible, but the Biblical record and secular history completely refute this. The Scriptures contain unfulfilling proofs that many others besides Jesus availed themselves of divine power and thus attained their freedom from adverse conditions. In Gibbon's history of the Roman Empire it is recorded that this spiritual power was utilized for 300 years after the ascension of Jesus. It was only after corruption and materiality had crept into the early Christian Church that this healing power seemed to be lost and to become dormant.
Discovery of Christian Science

Much Timber Sold on O. and C. Lands

W. H. Horning, chief forester for the General Land Office of the Department of the Interior, reports that 39,915,000 board feet of timber on the Revested Oregon and California Railroad grant lands was sold at the regular monthly sale held on April 11. The timber sold, in this sale, was on 13 widely distributed areas, located in various counties in Western Oregon. The total sale price was \$130,786.50.
The total sales of O. & C. tim-

ber since July 1, 1943, amounted to 304,107,000 board feet and sold for \$1,016,022.33.
Timber sold from O. & C. lands has contributed substantially to the log supply so necessary to the saw mills and plywood plants in this area in filling the needs of our armed forces for lumber and other wood products. Most of the timber cut from government lands in Western Oregon is obtained from the O. & C. lands.
The timber on the O. & C. lands is cut according to the requirements of sustained yield management. The total supply of timber available on these lands is ample to permit the perpetual harvesting of 500,000,000 board feet annually. Management practices are in effect which accomplish prompt reforestation of lands after ripe timber is cut. In general, this is done by leaving numerous trees for the natural reseeding of all such areas. In places, fire has taken such a heavy toll of the green timber that reforestation by such natural methods is impractical. Where that is the case, the damaged areas are reforested by the planting of nursery-grown seedlings. This season the foresters of the O. & C. administration are planting 1,000,000 trees on such an area which was devastated by fire in the disastrous Tillamook burn of 1933. While contributing heavily to the needs of war, the management of these lands looks to the future and prepares to supply the endless needs of peace after the war.
