Erwin F. Lange is to replace John Koehler as visual aid instructor and will have charge of the high school science and math courses.

Phyllis L. Gueffroy, who has been teaching swimming, life saving, and physical education at Willamette University, will be the new physical education instructor. Florence King Van Etten has signed to teach commercial studies. She has taught sixteen years in China and is now connected with the Springfield high school
