Petty officer ratings from third to first class, inclusive, are available to qualified men of 38 years or over who are not in an essential job. These men are sent to a

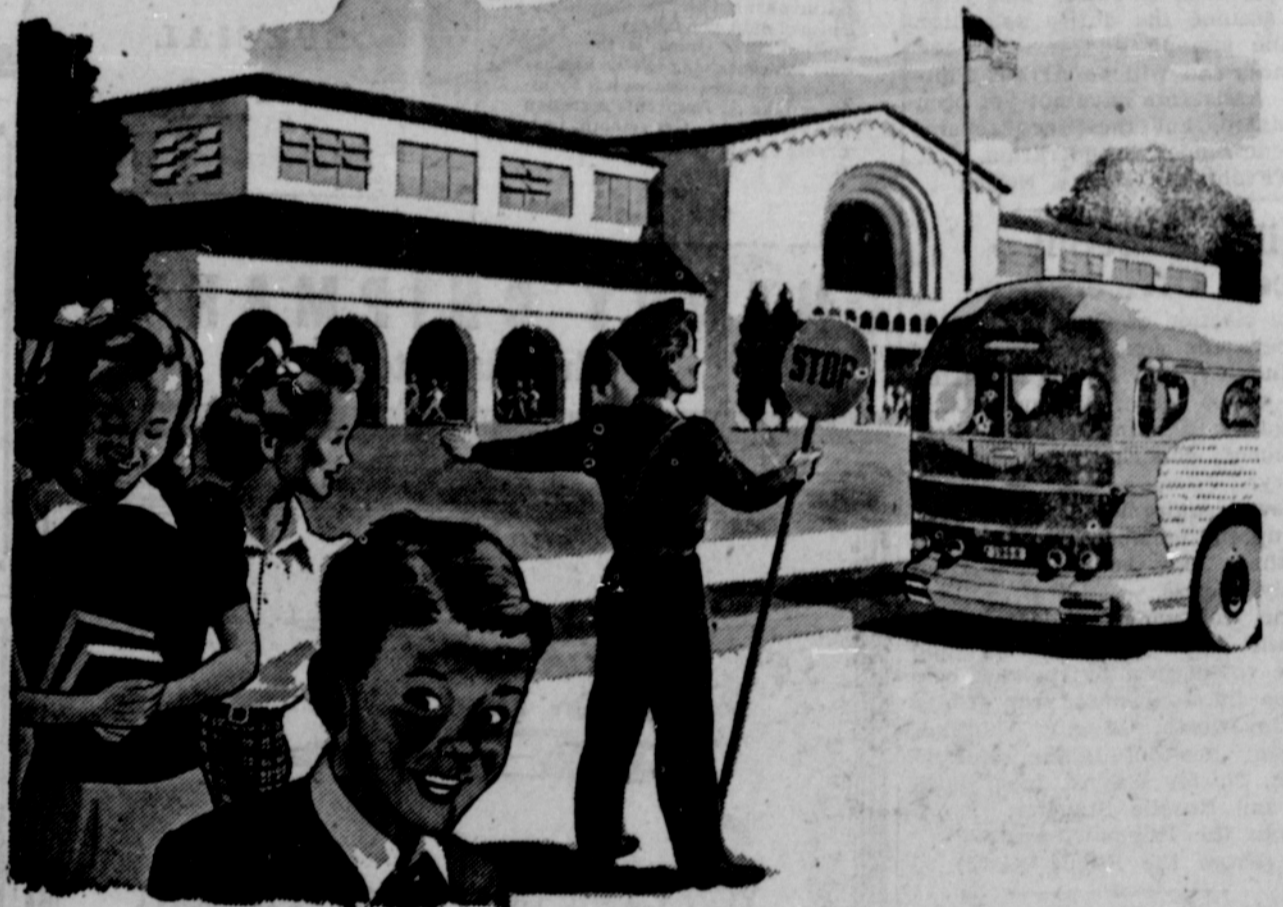
naval training center for a short period of indoctrination and then are given duty to fit in with their civilian background.
