### **OPA** To Issue **New Gas Coupons** In September

The OPA is preparing to issue new gasoline ration coupons, before September 21, as that is the date of expiration of the coupons now in effect. The new coupons will be good for four gallons each, it was indicated, but this does not give the motorist any more gasoline, as the books will contain only six coupons. The basic 120 miles per month still remains. The present coupons, eight in number were good for three gallons each. (By OLD TIMER)
