

Health Worker's Institute at EOCE

Vital problems in community health and the expanding health education program in Oregon schools will be the subjects for discussion at two of the sessions of the second annual health workers' institute at the Eastern Oregon College of Education, La Grande, August 28, 29, and 30, according to Mrs. Saldie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis Association. Speakers at these sessions include: Dr. Rex Putnam, superintendent of public instruction for Oregon, Dr. William R. Murlin, director of the division of tuberculosis, State Board of Health, Dr. James T. Speros, assistant professor of medicine at the University of Oregon Medical School, Dr. F. Sydney Hensen, Multnomah County Health Officer, Dr. John Francis Belz, director of the division of maternal and child health, Oregon State Board of Health, Dr. Wendell L. Van Loan, assistant superintendent of Vanport schools, Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer, Dr. G. C. Bellingr superintendent of the State Tuberculosis Hospital at Salem, and Dr. James M. Odell, superintendent of the Eastern Oregon Tuberculosis Hospital at The Dalles. Special sessions of the institute will be devoted to discussion of the organization and management of the County Public Health As-

sociations; to health education programs in schools and among adults; to methods and procedures in the annual sale of Christmas seals; and to the work of volunteers in aiding official health agencies.

All sessions are to be held on the campus of the Eastern Oregon College of Education. Health officers, nurses, school superintendents and delegates from county public health associations are registering for the work-shop sessions. All sessions are open to the public. The institute is held at the invitation of President Roben J. Maas of the College.

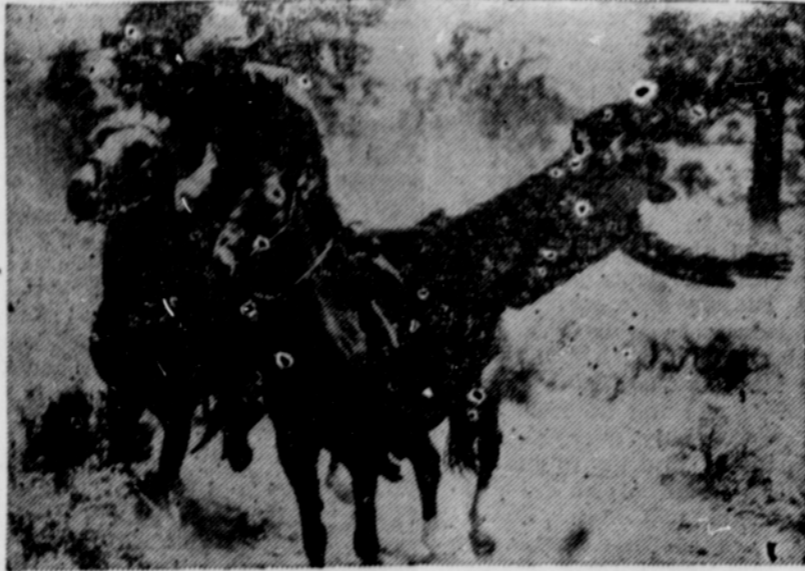

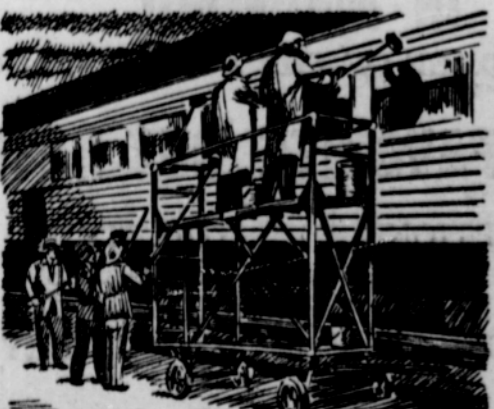

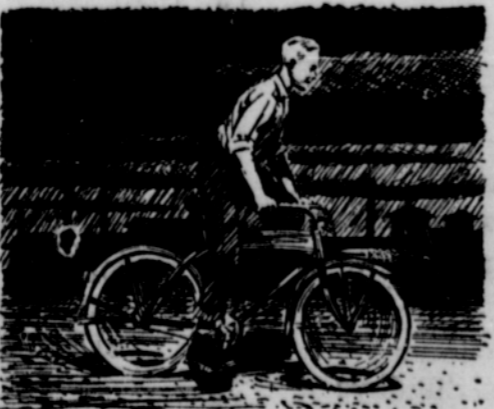
5 Lubricators, Greasemen, Boiler Inspectors and their helpers give locomotives a thorough going over at the end of every run, put them in tip-top shape.



6 Machinists, Blacksmiths, Boilermakers, Carmen, Sheet Metal Workers and other craftsmen repair war-worn equipment for the busy Main Line.



8 Car Cleaners, Car Inspectors, Air Brake Inspectors and Electrical Inspectors are among the thousands of workers who help to make the railroad run.



9 Last but not least, the Call Boy—smallest cog in the railroad machine. He wakes up the train crew and makes sure they report for duty on time.
