### County Forest Receipts Raised

Medford—Jackson county will receive from the national forest service receipts for the fiscal year ending June 30 last, \$74,000 Karl L. Janouch, supervisor of the Rogue River national forest reports. It is the county's share of 25 per cent of the receipts of the Rogue River national forest, in lieu of taxes for roads and schools.

The payment is \$45,000 higher than last year, due to the abnormal demand for lumber for war purposes, according to Supervisor Janouch. He doubts if such payments will be made in postwar period, but believes the planned sustained yield cutting operations will keep them at a substantial level.

### Butter Outlook Remains Critical

Dr. H. A. Ruehe, executive secretary of the American Butter Institute, said the civilian butter situation this year may be the most critical in the history of the industry.

Ruehe predicted that creamery butter production for 1944 will fall about 15 per cent below that of 1943. Also, the supply available to civilians this year will be about six pounds per capita, or a half pound per month per person.
