INFECTION KILLS JACKSONVILLE CHILD

Funeral services were held at Medford this week for Frederica Fause, 4 year old daughter of Mr and Mrs. Fred Faust of Jacksonville, Oregon, who died of blood poisoning following an accidental gun shot wound.

Hospital attendants said the bullet barely scratched the skin but had apparently caused infection leading to the child's death.

Traffic Rate Death Higher In Oregon

The Oregon traffic death rate, showing the number of traffic fatalities in relations to the exposure to accident, was slightly higher for the first seven months of 1944 than for the same period of 1943, Secretary of State Bob Farrell announced today.

The rate for this year was 9.6 persons killed per one hundred million miles of travel, compared to a rate of 8.5 last year.

For the month of July this year, traffic accidents claimed lives at the rate of 9.7 per one hundred million miles of travel, slightly under the rate of 9.9 for the same month of 1943.

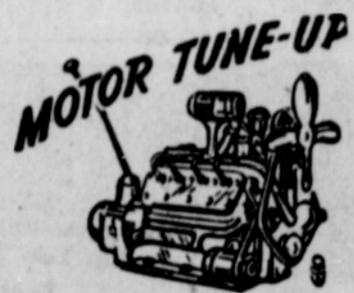
