

### Services Held For Mabel McLaughlin

Funeral services were held Tuesday afternoon at 1:30 at the Litwiller Funeral Chapel for Mrs. Mabel Elliott McLaughlin of Ashland. Rev. George Shuman was in charge of the service.

Mrs. McLaughlin came to Ashland three years ago in February. She had been a teacher and missionary, teaching in the Presbyterian schools in Mexico, until a breakdown in health made it necessary to quit and she then entered the Presbyterian hospital in Chicago. She was a devoted worker in the church of her faith, serving as teacher and Sunday school superintendent.

Mrs. McLaughlin was born at

Villard, Minnesota, June 5, 1861 and died Saturday, September 9. She has been in ill health since May. She was a graduate of the St. Cloud Minnesota State Normal, second in the class of 1900. She later attended Chicago University at Lake Forest, Ill.

In November 21, 1890, she was married to William McLaughlin at Fort Dodge, Iowa. In 1909, the family moved from Deawood, South Dakota to California and then to Ashland.

Surviving her are her husband, Wm. McLaughlin, and two sons, Everett Elliott McLaughlin, Sacramento, and Merritt Eros McLaughlin of Columbia, California two grandsons, M. T. Sgt. James S. McLaughlin, U. S. Marine Corps, in far Pacific Area and Morris E. McLaughlin, Sacramento and one great grandchild, Karen Marshall McLaughlin.

### Sgt. Motschenbacher Buys War Bonds

An Eighth AAF Fighter Station, England—Technical Sergeant Bernard P. Motschenbacher of Ashland, Oregon has "bought himself a piece of the air force."

He was among the first soldiers stationed on this Eighth Fighter Command Mustang base to make a purchase in the War Bond campaign staged by the Eighth Air Force to buy a "Victory Squadron". All planes flown by the Eighth will be represented in the "Victory Squadron" and each officer and enlisted man buying bonds in the drive becomes a "shareholder".

A quota was assigned to personnel of this base under the command of Col. William J. Cummings Jr., Lawrence, Kansas. They were allowed five weeks in which to strive to attain the goal. They rocketed past the quota mark less than two weeks after the drive had opened.

Motschenbacher, who formerly resided at 115 Fork St., Ashland, is the top ranking noncom in the engineering section of a Mustang squadron.

### Green Guards Report Forest Fires

There have been 179 small fires extinguished and 28 larger blazes reported to fire officers by vigilant members of Oregon's Green Guard during the present summer season.

This youth activity was initiated three years ago by the Keep Oregon Green Association for the purpose of adding the alertness of boys and girls to the already established public war on the ravages of man-made fires.

To partially reward and to recognize the services of the boys and girls, the Keep Oregon Green Association has awarded each an honor badge denoting appreciation for an invaluable service to the welfare of future Oregon. To further compensate Oregon Green announces their annual youthfulness Guards, Keep Oregon activity and essay contest. The essay topic is to be "A Tale from the Oregon Woods".

A total of nearly \$500 is to be awarded for the best essays and activity records. Special credit is given for service on a fire, reporting a fire and other services outlined in the Green Guard manual. The closing date for this contest has been set for October 10, 1944.

The future of Camp White depends upon the situation in the Pacific, Senator Cordon said, but that the hospital at the camp will be available for army use if needed. The camp will not be declared surplus, he said, until after consideration has been given to what use could be made of it in any postwar training program.
