

Dr. F. W. Walter Kresse and Dr. R. W. Clancy, both of Med-ord, have been indicted by the federal grand jury on charges of violating the Harrison narcotics statutes, and Dr. Oliver H. Clark, Myrtle Point, has been bound over to the grand jury on similar charges, it was announced Saturday by Assistant United States Attorney William M. Langley.

Kresse and Clancy have been ordered to appear for arraignment on October 3, when the Medford session of the federal court opens. They were indicted by the grand jury secretly last Wednesday for allegedly issuing narcotic prescriptions not "in the course of professional practice only" to persons, who in the course of proper medical practice

should not have narcotics.

Investigation of the Medford district by federal narcotic officials was prompted by the ex-treme activity of the sale of morphine sulphate, Langley reports. The investigation was ordered by the United States commissioner of narcotics. Indictments of the two doctors came as a result of investigation by a federal agent who allegedly procured morp-hine sulphate from both doctors.
