

New Mail Service to Navy Men Overseas

Persons desiring to send message to navy, marine and Coast Guard personnel overseas can avail themselves of the Navy's inexpensive and speedy Expeditionary Force Messages, Thirtieth Naval District headquarters announced today.

The service, now more than a year old, is available to anyone desiring to communicate with navy, marine or Coast Guard overseas personnel who are stationed with permanent duty post office numbers, or in some cases to certain mobile land based units with Fleet Post Office or Army Post Office numbers. Members of these services in turn may use EFM to communicate with persons at home. EFM service cannot be used to send messages to men aboard ships.

A total of 237 fixed texts are available to users of EFM service, any three of which may be combined to comprise one message which costs 60 cents, plus Federal Tax, and which may be sent from any local telegraph office. The texts are designed to cover a wide range of topics to meet every situation requiring fast communication service.

The Navy code address or Navy Number designating the unit to which personnel are attached is necessary to assure delivery of EFM. This code address, if not already known to persons wishing to send messages, may be obtained from the Naval Postal Affairs Section, Navy Department, Washington, D. C. Local telegraph offices can also be of assistance in this respect. In addition to the code address, EFM

communications should give name and rank or rating, and the activity to which the person addressed is attached.

In reminding the public of the availability of this service, the navy pointed out that in the first six months in which EFM was in use 200,000 messages were exchanged, with navy marine and Coast Guard personnel themselves sending 20,000 messages to the United States. The 180,000 messages went to the overseas.

Men over 38 who have been anxiously watching the mail-box to learn of their final disposition under National Selective Service can now relax and continue their civilian work with the assurance that they are in an age group not acceptable for induction into military service. Local boards have been instructed to place registrants of 38 and over in IV-A, to retain in I-C all men honorably discharged and to discontinue the I-A/L classification. Men in Class I-C may not be removed from this classification without action by the Director of Selective Service. Local Boards will put in other deferred classifications men found physically acceptable for limited military service only, who have heretofore been placed in Class I-A/L/

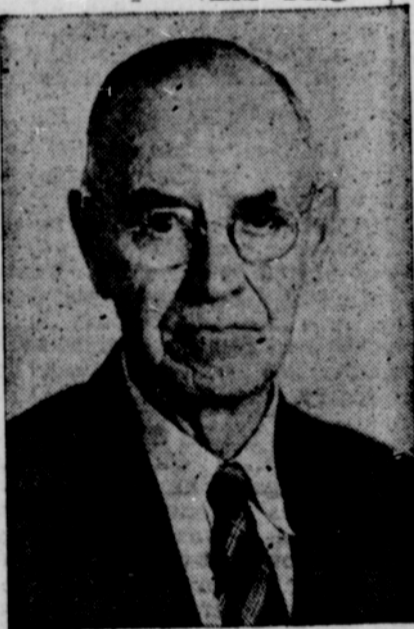
