



Seniors Lose, Juniors Win in Week End Tilts

Both Ashland Senior and Junior high teams took to the road last week end for their grid games. The Seniors going to Grants Pass on Friday for their fourth game and the Juniors traveling to Klamath Falls for their third try Saturday.

In the game at Grants Pass, the Senior high school took a shellacking to the tune of 19 to 0, in a game marked by heavy inroads made by the Grants Pass boys against a much lighter but aggressive Ashland team. Injuries during the week took three of Coach Stromberg's tackles from the lineup, which together with the superior weight of the Grants Pass men, spelled defeat to a fighting Grizzly team.

The game got under way with Grants Pass kicking to Ashland and the locals bringing back the ball to the Grants Pass 35. A holding penalty against the Ashland team set them deep in their own territory. The quarter ended with the Grants Pass boys making vicious thrusts into the Ashland line. The second quarter was a see-saw affair, ending with the Grants Pass team on the Ashland eight yard line. During the last half of the game, an array of end runs, etc let the Grants Pass team score three times, with the Ashland team unable to connect on the passing that scored so well against the Lakeview team.

Juniors in Lead

The Junior high team went into undisputed leadership of the Southern Oregon juniors Saturday when they romped all over a favored Klamath Falls aggregation on the Klamath field. The win gave the Ashland team a clean slate so far, having posted wins over Medford, Grants Pass and Klamath Falls.

Past games put Klamath one touchdown over the Ashland boys, but with the two teams quite evenly matched as to size and weight. In the first two minutes of play Ed Beare of Ashland raced 50 yards to draw first blood for the afternoon. Only a few plays later, Jerry Richardson got out in the open on a confused play and raced across the goal line for the second score. The half ended with the tally standing 14 to 6, after Klamath had been able to score on a long pass.

During the intermission Coach Roberts gave a pep talk with such good effect that during the last half they were able to score four times, and holding the Klamath team scoreless. The second team was run in and they too made one touchdown. The game ended 33 to 6 with Ashland on the long end of the tally.

American Legion Thanked for Fags

Emil Kroeger, commander of Post 14 of the American Legion here, received a letter from Lt. Samuel A. Wolfson, "somewhere in China" this week, thanking the local Legion for the generous donation of cigarettes they had received from the group here. Lt. Wolfson is special Service officer for the 23rd Fighter Group, of the 74th Fighter Squadron on active duty in China. Lt. Wolfson said "we received your shipment of Chesterfield cigarettes and distribution has been made to the enlisted men of this organization. These cigarettes are especially appreciated, as the military situation has prevented the normal post exchange issue of cigarettes from coming through. The men in this organization wish me to convey to you their deepest appreciation for the interest and thoughtfulness shown."

Mr. Kroeger explained that during the past year, milk bottles have been kept in a number of stores in Ashland, so that anyone who cared to could drop in any amount they desired for the purpose of buying cigarettes for the boys. The Liggett & Myers Tobacco Co. is sent the money, which buys the cigarettes at cost, with the government removing the tax against them, and they are then forwarded to any area designated by the Legion. Up to the present time, the local post has donated and sent to the various war theatres some 70 thousand cigarettes. This is the first letter they have had in return from any of the recipients of the donations.

Prisoner of War Exhibit Shown Here

Attracting considerable attention this week is the display of prisoner of war material in the window at the J. P. Dodge and Sons. The material has been furnished by the Red Cross. Included in the display are three maps showing known locations of German and Japanese camps. The names of Jackson county men who are prisoners are shown also. There are several photos of scenes in German camps, the capture kits, medicine kits and invalid food packages.

In the exhibit is the recreation made by the Junior Red Cross which serves 30 men and the items contained in the food packages which the Red Cross supplies for weekly distribution to the American and British prisoners in war in enemy hands.

Two copies of typewritten newspapers published by prisoners in German camps are shown. The exhibit is well worth seeing.

Medford, —Jackson county at the November election will vote on an initiative measure calling for a special levy for the improvement of facilities and construction of new buildings at the county farm near Talent. The measure empowers the county annually to levy \$36,000 taxes for three years. The taxes will be outside the state limitation clause. The measure is sponsored by the County Public Health association and the county court.

Juniors-Senior PTA Hears Explanation of School Measure

At the regular monthly meeting of the Junior-Senior PTA, held last Thursday, October 19, in the cafeteria of the Junior high school building, Superintendent Theo J. Norby was the main speaker of the evening. Subject of his talk was the proposed constitutional amendment, No. 314, to provide additional funds for the maintenance of Oregon Schools. In his talk Mr. Norby pointed out that at present Oregon is 13th in wealth in the nation but ranks 47th in its position in assuring school funds for the operation of the schools of the state. Under the proposed measure, 45 cents is assured to the school districts, instead of the 25 cents now assured. He pointed out that Ashland, under the 25 cents paid for each pupil each school day attended had been able to realize about \$25,000, which of course, brought down the school levy so that just that amount had been deducted from taxes paid by property owners in Ashland. He estimated that about \$20,000 would be brought in additional should the measure pass. The Oregon PTA and the Jackson County PTA council have gone on record as favoring the measure and at the meeting Thursday night the local organization also voted to support the measure.

Mr. Norby, touching upon one of the objects of the PTA "to bring into closer relation, the home, and the school, parents and teachers, should cooperate intelligently" at all times, told several amusing incidents which he had had prior to coming to Ashland.

Following Mr. Norby's talk, the matter of securing uniforms for the Senior high band was gone into. Mr. Mirick, director of the school band was called upon to discuss the proposition of securing the uniforms and after a lengthy discussion, the unit undertook, by vote of the members, to sponsor the project of getting the band properly uniformed. It was explained that there was a fund of some \$500 already available, through several years accumulation, by student activities, etc, and the unit will undertake to raise \$1500 more as it was found that uniforms for the 50 band members would take approximately \$2,000. The members were unanimous in stating that the band should have uniforms as the Ashland band is recognized as among the leaders in the state and all other schools in this area have had uniforms for some years.

Year books were distributed to the members, and a vote of thanks given the committee, Mrs. R. I. Flaherty, Mrs. S. L. Leonard and the Daily Tiding and the Miner for the work of getting out the program booklets.

Mrs. Grubb, president, presided over the meeting with Mrs. R. L. Crosby as secretary pro tem and Mrs. E. H. Hahn as treasurer, gave the reports. Mrs. Wines led the group in singing with Miss Nora Lunde as accompanist.

The executive committee, Mrs. Henry Ritchie, in charge served pumpkin pie and coffee following the meeting.

Rockefeller and wife; Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Myer; Mr. and Mrs. Heaton Fox; Mr. and Mrs. D. P. Brittain; Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Jacquette; Mrs. Jacob Wagner and Mrs. Mary Myer. From the very beginning the Methodist organization thrived and prospered, and until the present date it has filled a large place in the community life.
