American public when they give to the National War Fund Drive that is now on.

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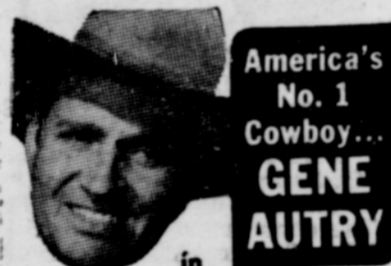

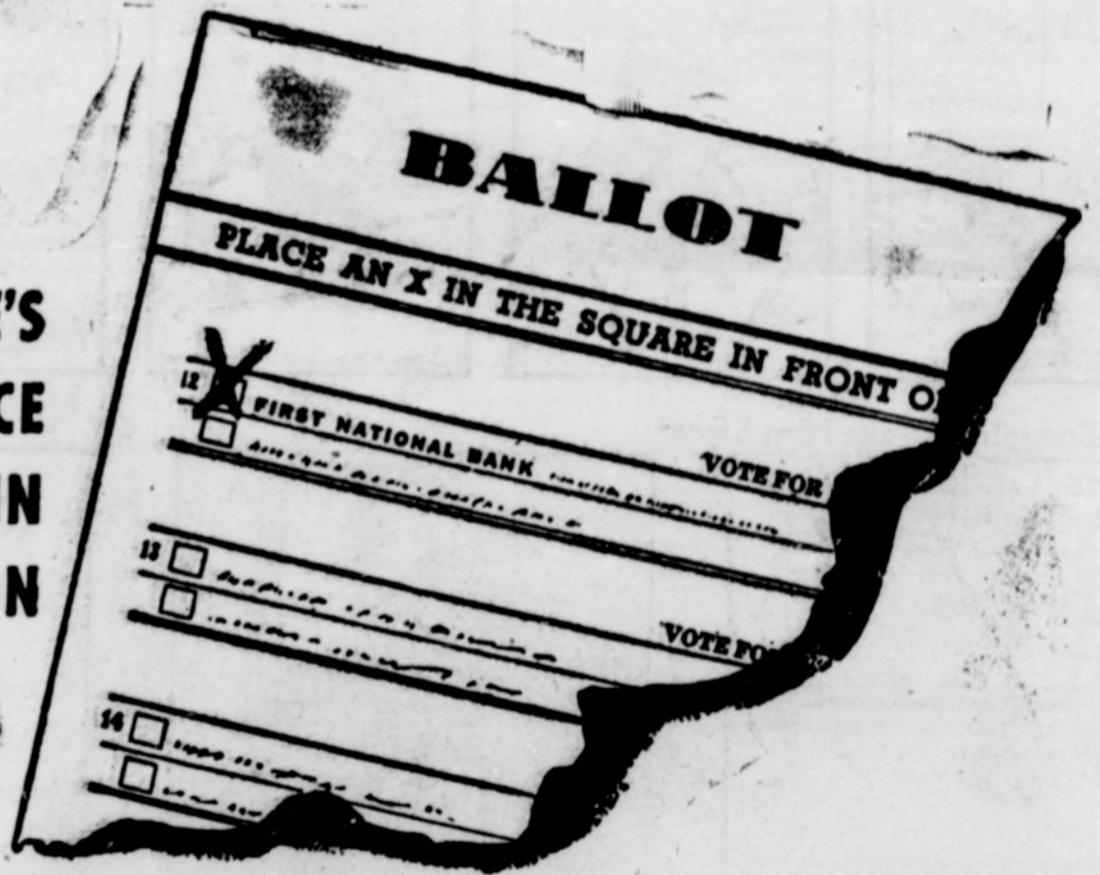
