#### **Drowned Man Found** In the Rogue River

The body of a man, found in Rogue River above the backwater of Ray Dam, was still unidentified last week pending full in-vestigation by Camp White, officers said.

The body was found by J. J. Jenkins, of Medford, who was hunting ducks on Rogue River, and discovered the body while crossing the river above a log jam. It was wedged between logs and almost completely covered by mud and silt.

On December 2, 1942, two Camp White soldiers were reported drowned in Rogue River, above the dam, and only one body has so far been found and identified. The body found Sunday was dressed in a khaki colored shirt and wore a plastic identification chain, but had no identification tags. It was esti-mated by Deputy Coroner Carlos Morris that the man had been dead about one and one-half or



#### Dairy Subsidy Near 4 Million in Year

During the one-year period that the dairy feed program has been in effect, nearly four million dollars in dairy production payments have been distributed to the state's farmers and dairymen through the county AAA committees, R. B. Taylor, state chairman, reports.

Payments are being made now for the months of September and October, at the rates of 70 cents a hundredweight for whole milk and 10 cents a pound for butterfat. Producers are asked to submit their evidence on sales as soon as possible, with December 31 the closing date for filing Sept ember-October applications.

From October 1, 1943, through August 31, 1944, Oregon dairy producers received a total of \$3,831,212 on 702,558,800 pounds of whole milk and 8,965,242 pounds of butterfat sold. The number of producers receiving the payments averaged 16,761 per

Taylor points out that the dairy production payments have helped to maintain war-needed milk by relieving the squeeze on dairy producers who were caught between rising feed costs and fixed ceiling prices for their products. Aas a part of the hold-theline program, the payments have been effective in preventing an in lationary price spiral for dairy products, the chairman said.

There were 22 drivers involved in fatal accidents and violations were reported for 14 of these. The violations included excessive speed with five drivers; disregarding traffic signs and signals, 3; improper or double parking, 2; following too closely, 2; driving on the wrong side of the road, 1; other violations, 1.

The mose ferquently reported driver violations in all accidents during the month were failure to yield right of way, 527 drivers; improper start from parked position, 179; following too closely, 22; excessive speed 172; on wrong side of road, 134. Of the total of 4,661 drivers involved in all types of traffic accidents in September, violations were re-ported for 2,353 or about 50 per-
