

Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, December 8 -Miss Jerrine Mote, instructor at the Southern Oregon College of Education has recently published a book through Allyn and Bacon publishing company, Boston. 
#### **Applied for Licenses** Small Number Have

Approximately 17 percent of gon have applied for their 1945 registrations, according to Robert S. Farrell ,secretary of state, who avoid last-minute delays.

With more than 400,000 vehicles registered in Oregon, slightly more than 70,000 applications now are on file in the secretary of state's office. While this is 21 percent ahead of last year, there should be many more in the near future ,if delays are to be avoided, Farrell said.

Windshield stickers now are being mailed from the state department and they may be attach ed to the windshield after December 15.


